

Hon. Sir James Lougheed :- "It Hon. Sir James Lougheed:— It will be obvious that we could not deport a Canadian citizen because 27, at Swift Current, by awkes stakes for both wheat and oats at deport a Canadian citizen because there is no place to deport him to. We do not deport British subjects who are such by naturalization but we propose to bring an amendment to the Naturalization Act by which we shall denaturalize undesirable regardless of the country from which they come, thus permitting deportation within the limit of time prescribed by the Statute.

The Free Press explains: "It would appear that practically all persons of British birth are subject to the penalty provided in the am endment for the reason that few immigrants of British birth have taken the trouble to be naturalized in Canada. On the other hand, very few foreigners in Canada are British subjects since very few were naturalized under the new act which provides for Imperial citizenship. Moreover, as has been stated, the Government has introduced an act providing for the denaturalization of undesirables from whatever country they have come.


