BIG PURCHASE.

HALIFAX, Jan. 1.—Harvey Patton of Albany and F. C. Smith of New York are here in connection with the purchase of lumber properties. Dur-ing the past two days contracts have been signed for the transfer of 65,000 acres of Sherbrooke lands to Mr. Pat-ton and his friends. OTTAWA, Jan. 1.-Mr. Blue today urnished the press figures showing he strength of the different religious ienominations in the cities of Tor-nito, Montreal and Ottawa. LUBMER SHIPMENTS. F. E. Neale's circular of lumber shipments from Aliramichi and Camp-beliton during file past season has just been issued. It shows that 13 vessels were loaded at Campbellton, carrying a total of 11,349,058 sup. ft. The aver-age shipments from the port of Campbellton for the last five years were 20 millions sup. ft. At the port of Miramichi 29 vessels were loaded, the total shipments being 44,393,334 sup. ft. The average shipments from this port for the last three years were 120 millions sup. ft.
