CAPTOWN PEOPLE AGAINST CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

They Made a Great Fuss Over the Execution of a Murderer Named Couper.

CAPE TOWN, Feb. 15.—An extraordinary movement against capital punishment has been proceeding here for some time past, and has been brought to bear with remarkable force on the case of a man named Couper, recently convicted of the murder of his legitimate infant. As far as Couper was concerned it failed in its object and the papers have been full of praise of the Governor, Sir Walter Hely-Hutchinson in refusing a reprieve. A public petition was presented to the Governor and was rejected. The mayor then headed a public demonstration which waited on Dr. Jameson, but Sir Walter still declined to reconsider his decision. A second demonstration headed by the mayor was equally unsuccessful. Finally a mass meeting to demand the reconsideration of Couper's sentence was held at the City Hall, but in spite of the storm the Governor never wavered, and met each demand to reconsider his decision with a final refusal, declaring that the crime was a brutal and a cowardly one. Couper was accordingly hanged, and the newspapers and even some of those who have favored the abolition of capital punishment approve the Governor's resistance to popular clamor.

COMPANY FORMED TO BOOM FLYING MACHINE

Swedish Inventor Thinks His Apparatus Will be a Success.

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 15.—A company has been formed at Gothenburg to float the invention of a new Swedish flying machine by M. B. H. Wallin, director of the material testing department of the Chalmers Institute, who has been working for two years at his discovery. The inventor states that the construction of his machine will run less than a thousand dollars, and will machines which have been hitherto therefore be much cheaper than those used for experimental purposes, so that capital already advanced is more than adequate for the first trials. The building of the airship will take some weeks, but the work is making rapid progress.

A motor for driving the machine is expected from Paris in a few days, the course of an interview M. Wallin expressed himself as very hopeful regarding his invention.

He said:—The problem of aerial navigation can be solved quite as easily as any other problem. It is only remarkable that the antiquated system of aerial navigation by balloon should have been adhered to so long."

TERRORISM RAMPANT IN FAIR MARSEILLES

City's Police Ignore the Many Outrages Which Occur Both Night and Day.

MARSEILLES, Feb. 15.—The reign of terror at Marseilles is continuing, and the bands of hooligans, who do not even stop at murder, grow more daring every day. Women in the streets, even in mid-day, no longer dare to wear jewelry. During the last fortnight six attacks have been made upon women wearing earrings. M. Reboul, a cashier at a large firm of carmen, was surprised on Thursday to see four men, armed with revolvers, enter his office. He was getting ready the wages of his men, and when he attempted to give an alarm the Apaches threatened to shoot him dead. He was forced to give them the amount of the wages—about \$75.

M. Rivoli, another cashier, who was in the habit of taking home with him the day's proceeds of his firm, was shot dead at the door of his house.

Numbers of young hooligans are permitted to parade the streets armed with revolvers and knives, with the result that citizens in self defense are obliged to walk abroad, even in the main streets, armed to the teeth. Shots are exchanged with a freedom that is reminiscent of an old-time mining camp in the Far West.

The local press entirely ignores the majority of the outrages that occur daily, and nothing in the nature of a real agitation has yet been raised.

On Wednesday night a man was shot dead near the railway station, his assailant getting away, as usual, scot free. This is now so common occurrence that it is looked upon as nothing extraordinary. Local indignation at the torpor of the authorities is growing, and M. Echenard, of the Hotel de Louvre, and the agents of the P. and O., British India and Allan Lines and Messrs. Cook's agent are all actively engaged in pressing for reform.

BULLDOGS BITE WOMAN TO DEATH

Mrs. Margaret Goss, of Abington, Mass., Victim of Five Brutes in Friend's Home.

ARLINGTON, Mass., Feb. 15.—In the home of a friend with whom she had taken shelter on account of illness, Mrs. Margaret Goss, of Rockland, was fatally bitten by five bulldogs early this morning. She died before a doctor could be obtained. Mrs. Goss left her home, in Rockland, yesterday afternoon, telling her husband that she was coming to Abington. During the evening she called at the Corey home, corner of Summer and Plymouth streets, less than two miles from home, and said she was feeling badly. The Coreys realized that it would be dangerous for her to go out into the cold, and gave her food and a bed in the kitchen for the night. Timotes of the house were awakened about three o'clock this morning by a noise in the rear of the house, where five valuable bulldogs were kept. Mr. Corey found the women unconscious on the kitchen floor surrounded by the dogs. Her neck, arms and legs from the waist to the ankles were badly bitten.

Medical Examiner Durley, of Brockton, viewed the body, but declined to make a statement until further investigation. Dr. Hutchinson says the bites were not sufficient to cause her death, which was probably due to shock in her weakened condition. She was about fifty-nine years old.

PRINCE OF BOURBON EARNS HIS LIVING AS A CLERK

PARIS, Feb. 15.—Two hundred and fifty Legitimists who believe that Prince Jean de Bourbon is the rightful king of France gathered in the chapel of St. Denis the other day to do homage to him on the anniversary of the death of his ancestor Louis XIV. Prince Jean earns his living on the clerical staff of an artisan well company, which has works in Algiers and an office in Paris. His brother, Prince Charles, is a clerk in an electric lighting firm.

Prince Jean and his wife and Prince Charles were present at the ceremony. As they came out of the chapel a large crowd which had gathered shouted, "Three cheers for the bride!" evidently mistaking the procession for a marriage party.

RIDES ON AVALANCHE TO A TERRIBLE DEATH

What Party of Three Woodcutters Regarded as Joke Has Fatal End.

GENEVA, Feb. 15.—Three Italian woodcutters of the village of Carenna, near the Swiss Italian frontier, were carried on an avalanche yesterday, and one of them was killed. They were descending the San Joris, to the east of Bellinena, on their sledges laden with wood, one of the men standing behind steering by means of a long pole. Suddenly cracks appeared in the snow on either side, and the men knew that they had started an avalanche.

As there were no obstacles in the way, the woodcutters began to joke about their journey being thus unexpectedly expedited, when the pace increased, and the snow, diverting its course to the right in the direction of a precipice, began to move with express speed.

The steersman threw himself into the soft snow, calling on his companions to follow him. One of them did so, but the other remained on the sledge and went over the precipice with it.

Sledge and woodcutter disappeared from view and no trace of them could be found. The other two men escaped with bruises.
