ABSCONDER POSES AS A RUSSIAN PRINCE
Welcomed by Aristocracy of Rome, He Cuts Big Figure in Eternal City.

ROME, May 4.—An absconder Bohemian bank clerk, who stole \$200,000 from a bank at Mikovits some months ago, was discovered today posing as Prince Vladimir Kichodinsky, who, with the "princess," a beautiful woman, has been a prominent figure in Rome since the beginning of the year.

The "princess" arrived in Rome in January, put up at one of the best hotels and frequented the highest society. The "princess" splendidly dressed, and the "prince" brilliant manners evoked general admiration. Most of the best houses were open to the "pair," when at the end of March they suddenly disappeared.

This morning a telegram from Frascati announced the arrest of the "prince" who in Bohemia was plain Karl Wenzel—a bank clerk. With Karl Wenzel—who had been making a series of motor car excursions in the lovely country surrounding the town.

He and the "princess" were quietly lunching when the captain of the Carabinieri stationed at Frascati strode into the room, tapped him on the shoulder and showed him a warrant for his arrest.

The "princess" was furious, and threatened the intervention of the Russian Embassy. The "princess" went into hysterics and was borne shrieking from the room, while a doctor was summoned. Her husband agreed to submit, but insisted on seeing his wife before he left the building.

The woman recovered miraculously when the "prince" spoke hurriedly in German, while the Italian officials did not understand. It is believed that he gave her instructions for the disposal of what remained of his booty.

The detective who traced Wenzel and identified him as the "prince" will receive the reward of \$1,000 offered for his detection by the bank of Mikovits.

RINGS ELECTRIC BELL, THEN KILLS HERSELF
Poverty's Pangs Drive Countess, Daughter of Wealthy Russian, to Suicide.

PARIS, May 4.—The Countess de Jotemps committed suicide in her apartment in the Boulevard Haussmann last night under dramatic circumstances.

She was a beautiful and highly accomplished woman and the daughter of a wealthy Russian landowner named de Kienich. She married the Count de Jotemps in spite of the determined opposition of her parents, and they came to live in Paris.

M. de Kienich assisted the young couple, who were without means, until several months ago, when the Count de Jotemps was arrested at the instance of a jeweler in the Rue de Choiseul on a charge of obtaining a pearl necklace on credit and paying it.

The jeweler was induced eventually to withdraw the charge, but M. de Kienich refused to help the count and countess further.

When their funds were exhausted the couple sold their costly furniture and moved from their fashionable apartments near the Bois de Boulogne to a shabby lodging in the Boulevard Haussmann.

After a period of great privation, the countess went to Russia to implore her father's aid. She returned empty handed and disappointed.

The countess grew more and more depressed, and yesterday evening she refrained from joining her husband at dinner on the pretext that she felt ill. As the count sat at the table the electric bell from his wife's room rang violently, and immediately afterward a shot was heard.

The count rushed upstairs to find his wife lying dead, with a revolver clutched in her right hand. She had pressed the electric button, and immediately shot herself through the heart.

ROUMANIAN PEASANTS BUTCHERED BY TROOPS
Terrible Reprisals Made on Innocent and Guilty in the Recent Revolution.

VIENNA, May 4.—Terrible reprisals are reported from Bucharest as being taken by the military against the riotous peasantry.

At Vlaschi, whence all the peasantry fled to the forests on the arrival of the military, leaving only the old men and children behind, twenty-five of the oldest men, including the Mayor, M. Constantin, aged 82 were executed after a short trial. M. Constantin's nephew, a lad of 14, was forced, it is said, to be present at the execution. A day later twelve peasants who were caught were likewise executed.

At Corova an officer personally shot a priest and a mayor, though they denied participating in the riots.

At Cimpulunga the Archbishop Marcin, his secretary, and fifty peasants were executed.

The peasants are said to be everywhere hiding in the forests till the courts-martial are over.

NEW YORK, May 4.—A dispatch from Los Angeles says Jimmy Coffroth, yesterday tried to sign Philadelphia Jack O'Brien to meet Bill Squires, the Australian heavyweight, for a battle at Colma, on May 30, provided O'Brien wins his fight with Tommy Burns next Wednesday. O'Brien replied that whether he wins or loses his fight, he will probably never fight again. Coffroth then made a proposition to Burns. If the latter is beaten by O'Brien Mike Schreck will meet Squires. Coffroth signed Bob Ward, O'Brien's sparring partner to meet Al Kaufman in San Francisco.

ENGLISH INDUSTRY DEAD.
LONDON, May 4.—The trade of the patternmaker has died out completely in the city of London. The widow of the last survivor of a once flourishing industry has just been placed on the pension list of the Patternmakers' Company, one of the old livery guilds.

ITALIAN GIRLS ON STRIKE.
ROME, May 4.—A strike of domestic servants, the first of its kind in Italy, has broken out at Arignano. The girls, whose organization is perfect, demand higher wages, a ten-hour day and extra pay for overtime.

BEES TERRORIZE CONGREGATION.
LONDON, May 4.—A swarm of bees, which has taken possession of the church roof at Kirkcaldie, in Cumberland, object to evening service. As soon as the lamps are lit the bees descend into the building and terrify the congregation, especially women with floral decorations in their hats.

EX-EMPRESS SUE FOR LOAN TO HUSBAND
Widow of Napoleon III. Refuses to Pay Note for \$320,000.

NICE, May 4.—The ex-Empress Eugenie is to be the defendant in a curious action for the recovery of a long-standing debt which is shortly to come before the Nice court. The plaintiff is a septuagenarian named Pierre Thierry, the next-of-kin of a wealthy shipowner of Nantes, named Martin Thierry.

In 1855 Napoleon III borrowed \$500,000 from the Nantes shipowner on a note of hand, and the amount was to be repaid with interest in fifteen years. The loan fell due in July, 1870. The lender had died in the interval, but Pierre Thierry, the present suitor and the dead man's nephew, presented himself at the Tuilleries a few days before the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian War. He was received by the emperor, who was attended by General Kellie, his aide-de-camp. The imperial debt, occupied with the approaching struggle with Prussia, was either unable or unwilling to discharge the debt, and suggested the renewal of the note for another fifteen years, undertaking at the end of the period to pay \$320,000 by way of principal and interest. Thierry accepted, and the emperor there and then signed a fresh promissory note for the sum mentioned.

The war intervened, Napoleon was driven from France, and Pierre Thierry, in the course of a hurried removal from his active city, lost all trace of the bond. The fifteen years expired, the emperor was dead, and in the absence of documentary proof it was useless to claim the debt from the ex-empress. Quite recently, however, M. Thierry, while strolling through the leaves of an old book, discovered the precious paper. It is in an excellent state of preservation, and the signature of the ill-fated imperial borrower is perfectly legible. Moreover, just beneath appears as witness the name of General Kellie.

Once in possession of the promissory note, M. Thierry lost no time in seeking to recover the fortune it represented. In order to comply with the law, and have a legal domicile in the same department as the defendant, he recently went to live at Mentone, which is a short tram ride from the villa of the ex-empress at Cap Martin.

The ex-empress is contesting the claim.

THE ADVANTAGE OF AN ACCIDENT.
"The small size of a propeller screw," says a noted shipbuilder, "is not due to the perception of any inventor of its greater effect as compared with a larger one, but purely to accident. Many years ago screws for steamers were made of iron, and being so large that it was deemed best to cast each blade in two parts and then weld them together. During a storm three blades of the propeller broke at the welding, reducing the diameter by more than two-thirds. To the surprise of the captain, when the ship was forward at a speed such as had never been attained before. Engineers then experimented with iron, and discovered that they were much more effective than large ones. Had it not been for that accident we might have gone on using huge bladed screws to the present day."

SICILIAN BRIGAND WRITES BIOGRAPHY.
His Adventures Being Related in the Pages of a Palermo Newspaper.

ROME, May 4.—Salomone, the notorious Sicilian brigand, has been writing his personal memoirs in the mountains amidst snatches of rest from his professional raids.

Salomone steals down by night to divers obscure hamlets in the valley near Palermo, and thence posts his copy by instalments to the Giornale di Sicilia, which has already published 150 pages of manuscript of his narrative about his ten years' prison experience and his encounters with the carabinieri. An interesting psychological fact is that Salomone never fails to inclose with his copy a present of 10 to 30 lire, to encourage the alertness of compositors and proof correctors. The newspaper has got a further advertisement from Governor Boya, of Ancona penitentiary, who has entered into a fiery polemic with Salomone, who is proving himself an astute adversary.

Meanwhile, the editor of the Sicilian paper is receiving many tempting offers from ethnological and criminological institutes in Italy and abroad for Salomone's original autograph manuscript, written on legal vellum, as they desire to subject the same to the study of graphologist experts.

FISHES CARRY BOAT A MILE ON THEIR BACKS
Mariner Caught in School of Herring Is Carried Out of His Course.

BALTIMORE, May 3.—Schools of herring moved into the head waters of the Chesapeake Bay to spawn, are now so thick that they dam the rivers and rowboats cannot get through them.

James Maddox, a fisherman, was caught in the midst of a large school of herring in the Gunpowder river and he says his boat was fairly carried along on the backs of the fish.

According to Maddox, despite his efforts at the oars, he was carried nearly a mile out of his course before he succeeded in extricating his boat from the school. In one haul of a big 600-fathom seine so many herring surrounded it that it was impossible to land the seine.

THAT ASSAULT CASE

A writ has been issued in the Supreme Court by Alfred G. Edgecombe, the City Road carriage manufacturer, against George McArthur, the well known contractor, for damages of \$10,000 for assault, battery and slander, alleged to have been committed in the Queen's Rollaway on Monday evening last. It is set forth by counsel for the plaintiff that Mr. Edgecombe, who is a shareholder in the rink, went there on Monday evening with three friends. Without having spoken to Mr. McArthur, he was accosted by him in a violent manner and was struck several times, accused of having committed crimes, threatened and spat upon in the face.

The case has created unusual interest throughout the city, and further developments will be followed eagerly. The information given to counsel by Mr. Edgecombe when the writ was issued, was that Mr. McArthur struck Mr. Edgecombe three times, used words of slander against him, and threatened to bite his nose off.

Mr. McArthur told the Star today that he was surprised to find that he was accused of striking or spitting upon Mr. Edgecombe. He states that on Monday evening he was at the roller rink and had some conversation with Mr. Edgecombe. He had intended the latter to build a carriage for him, but told him on Monday that he would not take the job, as the last vehicle he built for him (McArthur) did not turn out satisfactory.

This statement heated the argument, and matters relative to the managing of the roller rink were brought up. Mr. McArthur stated this morning that he wanted to sell his share in the rink, as he wasn't satisfied with the way things were going. Mr. Edgecombe intended to buy his share, but intimated something to Mr. McArthur to the point that he should not sell out. Mr. McArthur this morning denied having ever struck or spat upon Mr. Edgecombe, saying that only a heated argument took place. A. W. Baird and L. A. Curvey, K. C., are acting for Mr. Edgecombe.

Roller Race Tonight.

Tonight at the Queen's Rollaway a half mile race between William Alexander, champion of the Park Square and Fred Follis, champion of Malne. The men will start at 8 o'clock and the tenth race of the rink and at the end of the tenth race, great interest is being taken by friends of both contestants and it is expected to be a hotly contested roller race. Both the men have good records.

EFFECT OF WATER ON COAL.
How It Assists Combustion—Does Not Make the Coal Last.

It is often asserted that water on bituminous coal both aids combustion and "makes the coal last." Housewives who live where this coal is used and who are compelled to maintain stove or furnace fires are firm believers, as a rule, in this paradox. That water on coal cannot do both these people would know if they but thoughtfully considered it a minute. The facts are these (and any one may easily verify them): In a light fire—that is to say, a stove or house furnace—water sprinkled on large lump coal really causes it to burn more rapidly. It soaks into the strata, into the porous surface, and, being there converted into steam, the lump is split into parts or the surface becomes corrugated and cavernous, thus offering a larger area of carbon to the active oxygen of the air. If the water is in excess of the amount which will do this it then no longer aids combustion, but retards it. Again, if the coal is fine and dampness, nothing approaching wetness, however, may increase combustion by holding the particles apart, thus permitting the air to be admitted.

In short, says the Scientific American, water on coal favors combustion, when it does favor it, only by assisting the oxygen of the air to find more ready access to the surfaces of the carbon.

STEAMER BOUND TO MONTREAL CAME TO HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 3.—The Allan line steamer Sardinian, from London and Havre arrived this afternoon. The Sardinian sailed from Havre April 26th for Montreal, and got as far as Cape Ray when she saw the Dominion line steamer Ottawa, which sailed from Halifax for Montreal on Sunday night. The captain, therefore, decided to make for Halifax. While the Sardinian was off Cape Ray the Ottawa, also of the Allan line, bound for Montreal came up and changed her course to come to Halifax or await a chance to get up the Gulf in not known.

The Sardinian brought 563 passengers. Two hundred of the newcomers were French and the remainder were English. Forty are bound for the United States and the rest for Quebec and the west. The Sardinian sailed at midnight for Montreal. The Canadian passengers left at midnight by rail.
