IMPORTANT MATTERS DEALT WITH AT MEETING OF SCHOOL TRUSTEES

The School Board last evening decided to memorialize the provincial government for permission to issue bonds to meet the cost of building an annex to the Winter Street School. It was also decided to have H. A. Mott act as the architect for the new building, which is to be erected on the lot north of the present building and recently purchased by the board. The old building at present on the lot is to be sold at auction.

New Brunswick act required a pupil to attend on only one hundred and twenty school days. In a city like St. John such a regulation was a farce. The superintendent explained that it would be well if sections similar to those he had read could be brought into force in St. John. He was instructed to communicate with the chief superintendent of education concerning the matter.

The Board of Trustees also determined on the extension of the mainal training and domestic science instruction. An additional room for each subject is to be opened in the Waterloo street building. Frank S. Morrison, at present in St. Stephen, is to be assistant teacher of manual training at the salary of \$600 and Miss Northern will

ant teacher of manual training at the salary of \$600 and Miss Northrup will be assistant in domestic science. It is possible that rooms for the teaching of these subjects will be opened in the North End and on West Side.

**After the hearing the minutes of the preceding meetings the board, on the motion of Trustee Coll, decided that the matter of explaining to the Common Council the exact state of the schools sinking fund, be left to the chairman, the secretary and the chairman, the secretary and the chairman of the buildings committee.

The "dogs of war" is not a mere figure of speech. In remote time dogs were used for war purposes. Plutarch and Pliny relate many instances; i. e., of Agelisaus at the siege of Mantinea, of Cambyses in his expedition to Egypt of the King of the Geromantians in remaining his throne. Aeneas (600 B. C.) tells of dogs. These, however, were fighting dogs, Justly dreaded by the Roman soldiers.

The Roman military author, Vegetius, reports that dogs were used in the fortified towers to make known by their barking the approach of the enemy and to keep the garrison awake. Also during the middle ages war dogs were used for guarding camps and bulwarks. Scotch bloodhounds were specially reputed for tracking escaped prisoners. They were also used for attacking the enemy's cavalry, mutilating the horses with the prongs and hooks of their coats of mail. To these coats fire pots were attached, which set the camps on fire. 
