LONDON, Aug. 26.—Nathan Straus ic in London on his way buck to New York, after an absence of thirteen months, which has been occupied in pushing his propaganda for pasteurized milk in Germany, Austria and England. Mr. Straus is enthusiastic over the results he has achieved. His system of pasteurization has been officially adopted by the Austrian Minister of Interior and by the authorities of many German cities, while in England it has received the unqualified support of hundreds of medical men.

The doctors paid very little attention to Mrs. Bradley for three weeks following the transfusion of blood, and a week ago when they found her strong enough to undergo the difficult operation for the removal of the tumor, they were surprised to note the great thorities of many German cities, while in England it has received the unqualified support of hundreds of medical men.

Perhaps the most interesting feat accomplished in connection with Mr. Straus's work on the continent has been his experiment in Sandhausen, a village in south Germany. Sandhausen has a population of 4,000 and had a very high infantile death rate. Mr. Straus was satisfied that this was due to the quality of the milk supply, and

Straus was satisfied that this was due to the quality of the milk supply, and he made arrangements to take charge of it. Since January 1 last every drop of milk supplied to the people of Sandsausen has been pasteurized by Mr. Straus's system, and the results have been remarkable. In the first seven months of 1907 thirty childiren under one year of age died. In the first six months of the present year, during which they have been supplied with pasteurized milk, only nine children died.

"This conclusively proves," said Mr. her veins, and she seems to have lost her own former mental characteristics

"This conclusively proves," said Mr. Straus to the correspondent of the New York 8Times, "that two out of every three children who die under one years of age are killed by raw milk. I want no easier job than to go into a town and reduce the death rate of that town. I will undertake to cut it in half at once by merely pasteurizing the milk on which the children are fed."

Mr. Straus is crossing to Dublish. pecially a child, who has abnormal men-tal traits, may be corrected through the injection of a different blood—blood from a normal porson—into the system of the abnormal one.
