## ASK COUNTY COUNCIL TO COMPENSATION ACT PAY COMMISSIONER OF CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY COMMISSION HEARD LUMBER OPERATORS

Delegation Ask That Two Thousand Dollars Be Provided for That Purpose. Only Suggestion Offered Was That Employees Pay Part of the Assessment.

The finance committee of the Municipal Council met yesterday afternoon and passed the budget for the coming season of the council in May. A number of bills were passed for payment and it was decided to recommend that the offices formerly occupied by Inches and Hazen be secured and the county treasurer and auditor be located in them and thus place the county officials all in the one building as well as providing a place for committee meetings.

A delegation appeared before the committee on behalf of the St. John branch of the Red Cross Society and asked that the amount of \$5,000 which was voted by the Municipal Council to the provincial branch, be paid to the local branch. The committee decided to recommend to the council that the original grant be amended and the amount be paid, \$4,500 to the St. John branch and \$500 to the Lancaster branch.

A delegation composed of A. M. Belding, T. H. Estabrooks, M. E. Asar, Rev. J. C. D. Appel and Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, appeared on behalf of the Children's Aid Society and asked that the municipality provide \$2,000 to pay the salary of Rev. W. H. Robinson as commissioner or judge for the society. The committee decided that as they had no money available it would be impossible to grant the request. The committee for next year would provide a sufficient sum to pay the salary of an agent for the society.

The committee felt that if the government appointed a commissioner with provincial powers the province rather than the municipality of St. John should pay his salary, but they were willing to recommend the payment of a salary of a local agent.
