MONCTON.

Moncton, N. B., July 22.—Barnum & Bailey's circus drew by far the largest number of people ever visiting Moncton on any one day. A large delegation came from the island, and a large number of people were present in the afternoon. The evening was simply attended.

Upon the arrival of the St. John, D. S. of Salisbury, reported to the police he had been robbed of \$120 between Salisbury and Moncton. 240 MORE PUPILS FOR HIGH SCHOOL

List of Those Who Passed—Syrian Boy, One Year Studying English, is Among the Number—Feared Building Accommodation will be Taxed.

Of about 260 who took the High School entrance examinations last month, about 240 passed. Of this number Wm. Walsh stands at the head, with 913 of a maximum of 1000 marks, winning the Trueman medal. Others who stand well are Lauretta Tracey, with 906; George McDavid, 896; Herman Young, 890; Pitta Sampson and Pearl Long, 870; Cyril McKinnon, 865; Grace Ferguson, 864; Mary Cullen, 862; Genevieve Hansen, 851; Helen Harrington, 844; Norah Carter, 835; Howard O'Neil, 834; and Basil Winter and Arthur Anglin, 825. Leonard McGuire, Harold Carleton, Edward McDade and William Maher also passed, but as none of their marks on geography and history not having been made up, it was not possible to give their totals.

The number taking the examinations this year was much larger than last year, so much so that it was found impossible to hold all the examinations in the High School building, consequently they were conducted in the various school buildings throughout the city. Many more candidates passed this year than last, and it is thought to be a question if the High School building will be large enough to accommodate all. It has been further said that at the present state of our arrangements will have to be made to handle the increasing number coming into the High School each year.

A feature of the examinations this year is found in the marks made by John Murray, an Assyrian, who has 594. When taken into consideration that he has been only a year at school here, during which time he learned the English language, his passing at all is the more remarkable. He was a pupil with Wm.
