careful study to all these questions, and has had the benefit of observing conditions widely. He would, I know, be deeply interested in what you have written, and if you mention to him that you are writing upon my suggestion he will, I think, gladly give you the benefit of his views.

Let me again congretulate you on the splendid part you are taking in the shaping of the future of your Province. I have come to look on you as the ideal citizen, and the views expressed in the article I have just read confirms me in this belief more strongly than ever. By all mease continue the good work you are doing for there is no finer service a man can render his country.
