
That the College shall be called Knox College, and that the College Committee to be appointed take steps for raising funds, obtaining a site in Toronto for College buildings, establishing an Academy or High School, and appointing a Master for the same, and the Moderator was instructed to correspond with the Colonial Committee of the Free Church of Scotland for the immediate appointment of an additional Professor of Theology from the list of five Ministers of the Free Church of Scotland, submitted by the Committee.

Mr. Esson submitted a course of Study which was adopted ad interim, and the College Committee was instructed to revise it and report to the Commission of Synod for approval.

In 1847 the Synod gave large attention to College matters. It confirmed the appointment of Alex. Gale as Principal of the academy, which had been established, and appointed him Professor of Classical Literature in Knox College.

Thus the College was established with two Departments, a Theological and Preparatory.

In 1848, among other things, the Synod appointed a Committee to draw up, after consulting with the Professors of Knox College, and the Professors of New College, Edinburgh, a Constitution for the College, and to transmit the same to Presbyteries for advice, and to report to next meeting of Synod.

In 1849, on the report of this Committee to draft a "Constitution for Knox College, including arrangements for its Government, Discipline and Curriculum of Study," the draft was sent down to Presbyteries, and they were enjoined to report upon it on or before March 1st, 1850, in order that the Professors' Court may be able to report to Synod at next ordinary meeting.

From 1850 to 1858, the Synod was engaged in preparing a Bill of Incorporation. In the latter year the College Committee was instructed to endeavor to get
