PROGRESS OF THE WAR [June 8 to June 14] On the Western front, the week under review, furious fighting prevailed, especially about Verdun and the Ypres salient.

On the Eastern front, the week under review, the Russian campaign in Europe was actively engaged with the German under Von Hindenburg, and were not holding them in check but were beginning a drive that promised to be successful as that against the Austrians in Volhynia, Galicia and Bukovina.

Very little transpired concerning the Russian campaign in the Caucasus region and in Persia, but such reports as were received indicated that the Russians were withstanding all the Turkish assaults, some in great force, and were making a further forward movement.

No reports were forthcoming of the British troops in Mesopotamia; but a British force was said to have occupied an important place in the south-west of Persia.

Little or no news was received from the campaign in Egypt. In German East Africa the British made further gains in the north-east; and in the south-west the troops operating from Northern Rhodesia made considerable progress, and occupied the town of Bismarckburg on the south-east shore of Lake Tanganyika.

The Belgians troops also made further gains in the north and north-west. No conspicuous hostilities were reported from the Balkans; but a political crisis was imminent in Greece, due to the blockading of Greek ports by the Entente Allies, who also forced the complete demobilization of the Greek army.

U. S. PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN On Saturday last Judge Hughes received and accepted the nomination for the Presidency by the Republican Convention at Chicago.
