But on the distinct and positive understanding that these coupons were not to be issued to the company, nor to be sold, until the city should be in arrear in paying any year's rent for the electric light. "The said works (that is the electric plant and light and the railway) to be completely tree from all charge to the city save and except the payment of the said \$7.500 which is the value of the said electric light, and is the num agreed to be applied in guaranteeing interest as aforesaid, and if the company pays such interest so guaranteed by the city or if the company hold the bonds the city will pay the \$7.500 to the company. And if the city pays any sum to any bondholder of the company for or on account of any of the said coupon debentures such sum so paid shall be held to be in payment and satisfaction of the liability of the city for such lighting to the amount so paid." so paid."

"And also that if the said Company shall neglect, refuse or fail to construct, maintain and operate the said railway in manner hereinbefore set forth, and to supply the said city with the said electric light and power to perform the conditions hereinbefore set forth or any of them, either in respect of the said railway or electric plant, that the liability of the city for and the payment of the said sum of \$7,500, either on the guarantee or coupon debenture, or to the company shall cease, and the city shall not be liable to pay any sum whatever in respect thereof."

Now I thought and think still, that is quite sufficient to protect the city and no man knows better than Mr. atkinson, that any person taking such debentures under such a by-law takes them subject to the provisions of such a by-law, and the conditions thereof, and not as a negotiable instrument. The law on that point is as clear both in Canada, England, and in the United States as it is possible to be.

But when the provision is added that these terms shall be expressed on the face of the coupons surely Mr. Atkinson should not talk about persons taking without notice and being entitled to demand payment, if the terms are not complied with, because it is not the case.

A number of rumors concerning this affair reached Chatham last evening, the one most generally received being somewhat as follows: Cleveland, the man shot at, was down on the beach with the wife of another man, a resident of Uncle Sam's domains, supposedly preparing for an elopement. The husband, learning of their departure, gave chase and coming upon the couple at once opened fire upon his wife's lover mortally wounding him; he then bundled the woman into his own rig and drove off leaving upon the sand the man who had loved not wisely but too much. Some said that at the first shot Cleveland had fallen dead, pierced through the heart; others that he was mortally wounded and died shortly after the encounter. Still others declared that when the husband opened fire upon him he returned it and that both were seriously wounded.

The husband in the case, who is said to have done the poor shooting, was one Benjamin Loomis who was just settling in Blenheim whence he had moved from Ohio with his wife, a former resident of that district. 


