Williams' Motion in Connection With the Corbin Land Grant.

STOLEN JEWELRY RECOVERED.

The Loot From Chalmers, Mitchell & Spring's Store Found at Spokane. SPOKANE, Wash., April 26.—(Special.)—The jewelry stolen from Chalmers, Mitchell & Spring's store at Rossland last February has been recovered in this city through some clever detective work by Joe Warren.

At the time the robbery was committed Warren was notified of it and kept close watch for the thieves since that time. On Sunday last he discovered that a quantity of jewelry had been checked from Rossland to this city. He went before Justice Backus and secured a warrant to search the Northern Pacific Custom Inspection Company with Constable Orr he went to the place and found a small hand valise which contained the stolen articles.

The valise was taken to Warren's office and an inventory taken of the goods inside. There were 105 rings of various stones, 30 watches, most of which were gold, bracelets, breastpins and other articles of jewelry. Some of the stolen goods were not in the valise. This morning United States Custom Inspector Malone came down from Northport and demanded the valise and its contents, claiming they were contraband. Warren refused to give them up until Malone proved they were contraband. The jewelry is now in the possession of Constable Orr, bailiff of Justice Backus's court.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon Judge Hanford of the United States Court, issued an order to release the goods but Detective Warren proposes to fight the case. Malone's endeavor being to secure possession of the goods in order to secure a reward upon returning them to Rossland. Warren says if Malone wanted to aid the law he would not be so anxious to secure the goods and thus give the matter publicity. He would rather capture the robbers when they called for the money, but Malone's action has frustrated this move.

SEIZED FOR CUSTOMS.

Jewelry Stolen From Chalmers, Mitchell & Spring's Store at Spokane. SPOKANE, Wash., April 27.—(Special.)—United States Marshal Drake this morning recovered \$1,200 worth of rings, watches and other articles of jewelry, thought to have been stolen from Chalmers, Mitchell & Spring's, at Rossland, in the United States Custom Inspection Company's possession. The goods were contraband, having been smuggled into the United States without paying the customs duties.

After the requisition of seizure had been issued in the United States court, and before the goods were taken to the federal court by Justice Backus, came into the federal court and delivered to get the writ of seizure remanded and the matter kept quiet until the persons who stole the property, and who thought to be in Spokane, could be apprehended. This Judge Hanford refused to do, saying that no action could be taken on the writ until it has been served and returned to the court.

INCORPORATION EXPENSES.
