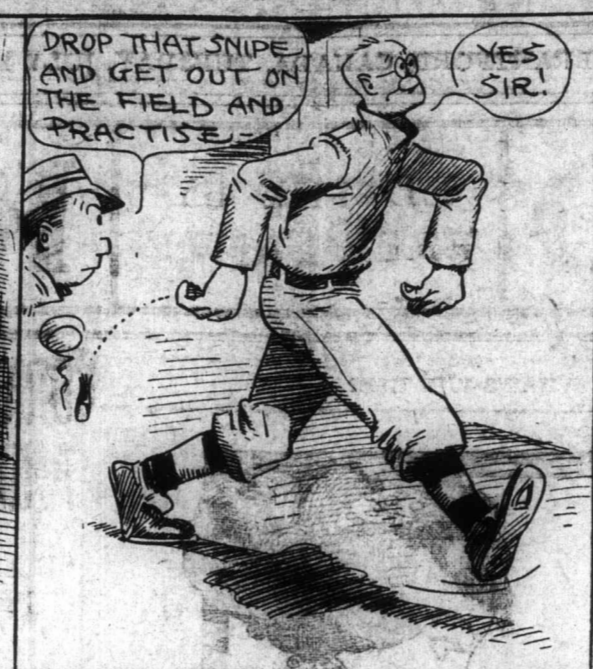
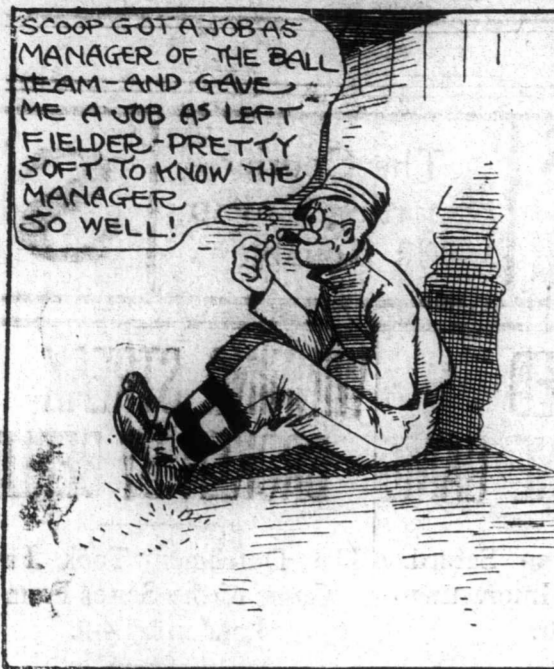

REAL ROUTINE AT THE COUNCIL

Only Two Committees Presented Reports at Meeting Last Night.

Routine work at the city council last night was featured by little of the spectacular. Only two committee reports were presented, and there was little discussion. Board of Works The Board of Works report was as follows: That the application of the Ham and Nott Company, limited of June 27th, for permission to cross Murray street, with a switch, be granted, subject to the approval of the Board of Railway Commissioners. That the City Solicitors be instructed to write the G. T. R. Co., calling their attention to the use of switches on Clarence street for purposes for which they were not intended, and that if this is not remedied the matter will be taken to the Board of Railway Commissioners. The City Engineer to furnish data for this complaint. That the Township Clerk, Mr. J. A. Smith, be notified that the Board of Works will be pleased to meet a deputation of the Township Clerk in reference to the improvement of Abigail Avenue and the extension of Lawrence street to the Paris road, on a date to be agreed upon. That the request of the American Radiator Company for permission to lay a 3 inch drain on Greenwich St. be granted, the work to be done to the satisfaction of the City Engineer. That a cement walk be laid by the

city on the south side of Terrace Hill St. from St. Paul Avenue to the crossing at the hospital. That the application of George D. Heyd for permission to remove house on Block "T" on the south side of West Mill street, be granted. That the matter of using oil on the market square and the streets before over till next season. The cost of oiling the market square will vary from \$143 to \$246, according to the cost of this service in Toronto and Hamilton. That the following communications be filed: A. E. Watts, of June 26th; J. R. Parsons of July 5th; petitions of Wm. J. Mellon and others of June 10th; Wilkes & Henderson of May 23rd; T. L. Wood of May 30th; Wm. Barrett of May 21st; A. E. Watts of April 30th; John Clements, of April 14th; Watrous Engine Works Company of April 10th; H. F. Leonard, March 31st, and that the letter of Harvey Yake of July 5th be referred to the City Solicitors. That the cement walk to be laid on the north and south sides of Hall Street, be placed on the outside of the boulevard, a sufficiently signed petition for this purpose having been filed. Ald. Suddaby said he received a petition against the removal of Geo. D. Heyd's house, but had been assured that the removal was legal in every way. Ald. Broadbent kicked on shelving the market square oiling proposition. He wanted to see an experiment, regardless of cost. Merchants were spending a lot in lost merchandise every month, and something should be done. Ald. Pitcher—"When oil is on the street, the man in the moon holds his nose every time he passes it." The rejection of oil as a dust layer was commended. Ald. Minshall also remarked that butter on the market, if the latter were oiled, would not be worth buying. The works report was carried. Finance Committee The Finance Committee reported as follows: Re. certificate of judgment of His Honor Judge Hardy, dated June 24th, 1913, in the matter of the appeal of W. G. Raymond, Post Master, J. C. Montgomery, Assistant Post Master, M. J. Donohue, Inland Revenue Officer, and Gordon Smith, Indian Superintendent, against the assessment in the City of Brantford. Your committee would suggest that the City Solicitors be empowered to take this matter up through the proper channel and find out exactly where the City of Brantford stands in reference to the assessment on the income of civil servants, as there seems to be a diversity of opinion of judgment in connection with this matter, the same contention having been taken up by certain parties, in Berlin, the High Court of Justice was asked to appoint competent officials to deal with the matter, and the Chairman of the Ontario Railway Board was appointed to sit in judgment on the matter, and his judgment was that they were entitled to pay, and on communicating with other centres, we find it is the un-

versal custom for Government officials to pay their income tax. Re. communication of Messrs Northway & Co., of July 7, 1913. Your committee would suggest that Northway & Company communicate with their predecessors, who would be entitled to pay the difference that they are asking rebate upon. There is no doubt in our minds that Mr. Robinson will see that his proportion of the taxes is refunded to Messrs Northway & Co. Re. the Brantford Roofing Company of July 18, 1913, and re. communication of J. C. Watt, of June 23, 1913. Your committee having taken this matter up, have been advised that the proper course for these parties to pursue is to enter an appeal to the Court of Revision, and they will deal with the matters, as the same are within their jurisdiction, and that the Clerk notify these parties to that effect. That the Ontario Municipal Association be paid the annual fee of \$25, and that the Clerk and the Treasurer are hereby authorized to attend the convention. Ald. Spence, who submitted the report, explained that there was diversity of opinion in regard to income taxing of civil servants, and it would pay the city to follow the matter up and secure a definite decision. Mr. J. C. Watt asked for rebate on property used by the Bible Society, but the property was assessed against the owner, J. B. Holt, and the committee could take no action in his case. The proper tribunal was the Court of Revision. THEFT OF £20,000 WORTH OF JEWELS Suspected Man Leaps Through Station Window Stolen jewels to the value of £20,000 were recovered by the New York police as a result of a railway cloak-room search. The jewels had been stolen from the safe of a well-known Fifth Avenue firm of jewellers, and there was no clue to the authors of the robbery. The safe had obviously been opened with a key, but interrogation of the staff failed to reveal the culprit or accomplice. On the chance that the robber or robbers had not had time to remove their booty from the city, a cloak-room search was inaugurated, and in the Pennsylvania Railway depot the police found a new valise, which had been deposited the day before by a man resembling one of the jewellers' clerks. The bag was opened, and the jewels were found intact, and when the clerk was summoned to the police station, and asked to explain his possession of the bag, he admitted in confusion that he had recently purchased a valise very similar. His questioners becoming more pressing, the clerk began to edge toward the door, but seeing that escape in that direction was hopeless, he jumped through the window, and got clear away. Later, however, he was arrested and confessed that he had stolen the jewellery and left it in the cloak-room to await a favourable opportunity for its removal. Brooklyn Gets Schmutz. NEW YORK, July 22.—Officers of the Brooklyn Baseball Club yesterday announced the purchase of Pitcher Schmutz from the Vancouver Club, of the North-western League. He will report in September. Schmutz's 1912 record was—Batting, 109; fielding, 957; pitching, 423. He officiated in 33 games for a total of 261. Ballplayers Nearly Drown. CHICAGO, July 22.—Five members of the Washington Americans narrowly escaped drowning in the unusually heavy surf in Lake Michigan, Monday. Walter Johnson, Al Smith, Henry and Laporte were caught in the undercurrent, and got back from a hard struggle. Gideon was dashed against a pier and stunned. Council Jottings--What Was Doing Last Night in a Minor Ke

The quorum present when proceedings opened: Mayor Hartman, Ald. Spence, Charlton, Minshall, Broadbent, Quinlan, Pitcher, McFarland, Sutch, Ward, Ryerson, Suddaby, Woodams. The Hydro-Electric time lists up to June 30, were \$1,322.35. An appeal was read at the meeting last night for money for the memorial to Sir Louis Cartier. The communication was filed. The Brantford Foundry Co. asked the City for switching accommodation from the Grand Trunk. City Treasurer Bunnell reported civic receipts during June \$4,003.03, expenditures \$63,492.00; bank overdraft \$3,204.1. The County Clerk of Norfolk asked for Brant's co-operation in the establishment of a provincial farm in Norfolk County. The Parks Board want the city to hand over a deed of land to the river front from Jubilee to Church street. Mayor Hartman explained that the Parks board had passed a resolution allowing the Lake Erie and Northern Railway to start construction and it was deemed advisable to let the board settle the question of damages. The better job the railway does the less the damages will be. The board of works will deal with the matter. Ald. Ward and Sitchel were called to order by the Mayor. They left chairs to have a confab with the back benches and the mayor didn't like it. A by-law was passed authorizing the sale of lots on Yorkshire Avenue to the Lake Erie and Northern Railway for 800 and to Dr. R. H. Palmer for \$500. The by-law was incorrectly drawn and the aldermen had to do a lot of clerical work before they got it through right. A second by-law authorizing the expropriation of Lots 71 and 12 on Elizabeth street for corporation purposes was also passed. Owners will have to file a statement of their claims within 90 days after being served with expropriation notice. Ald. Broadbent wanted to know the rule as to the construction of sidewalks. Ald. Suddaby said an outside walk required a petition of the ratepayers on each side of the street.

He asked for an immediate investigation. Ald. Suddaby said that the Township council was taking the matter up, and he would press upon them again the necessity of action. Ald. Sutch wanted to know about the construction of a walk on Wellington street from Charlotte to Alfred on the south side. Ratepayers on the north side were having their boulevards destroyed. Ald. Suddaby said a cement walk had already been ordered. Ald. Charlton wanted to know what had been done to repair Brant Avenue pavement; also if the street railway had paid tax arrears. Mayor Hartman replied that legal proceedings were under way. In regard to the street railway \$5,000 arrears had been paid and the total was to come off Sept. 16. The Mayor said this year's taxes had not been paid—not one cent—and a new writ was issued on Monday against the company. Ald. Suddaby admitted that the brick work on Brant avenue pavement was in very bad shape. It was laid by the Bitulithic Co., and they were responsible as far as Church street. He had written the company of the danger. If they didn't act, the city would itself. Ald. Ward reminded the council that Ald. Spence had pointed out some time ago that the Eagle Place dyke was defective, a cement walk at Baldwin avenue having crumbled away. The result was that there was little between Eagle Place and destruction.
