This was the authoritative message which Hon. Mr. Kemp, last night, delivered at a Conservative meeting in Toronto, and incidentally to the whole country. He said in part:-"If constitutional considerations

were alone regarded it would have been proper to have held an election in the Autumn of 1914 or 1915. The higher consideration of the public interest and decent regard for public opinion were taken into account by the Government, and an extension of the Parliamentary term was proposed for reasons which apply with equal if not greater force to such further extension as will make an election unnecessary during the continuance of the war.'

"For that reason the Government proposes to ask for such further extension as may be necessary; and responsibility of determining whether a war election shall be avoided or whether party strife shall be precipitated and carried on during the tated and carried on during the pending struggle.
