



SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NEWS

WEST LAND REGULATIONS—The sole land regulations under the act of 1914, which was the commencement of the act, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during their residence times under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one priority in applying for entry as local Agents' office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

WAR PUBLICITY IS VALUABLE SAYS BRITISH WAR PRESS AGENT

How Opinion on the Subject has Changed—Eye-Witness Plan Has Broken Down—Great Britain Will see Game Through With Her Cards on Table

(By Lieut.-Col. John Buchan.) London, Aug. 9.—Every specialist is, at first, wary of publicity, sooner or later his opinion on the subject changes. He learns that he cannot do what he wants to do unless the public understands.

This is true of specialists whose work may be termed only semi-public, such as men in the Press, Chateaux. Representatives of the allied and neutral press also have a chateau.

Fourth—Special articles by well known writers, such as H. G. Wells and Arnold Bennett and by representatives of individual newspapers permitted periodically to visit the front.

On other fronts of the British army and navy, the same general plan is carried out on a less extensive scale. With regard to the fleet, largely because of physical reasons, the communications and official dispatches have many visits have been arranged for newspaper representatives.

This growth of an appreciation of publicity was not confined to the army and navy. The need began to be understood in other governmental branches and men were detailed to handle the work. As part of the present prime minister's overhauling of the government, a Director was created for the business of propaganda and publicity. The decision as to what can be published about the fight lies ultimately in the hands of the government, and the admiralty, but just as it is the business of the Treasury to watch all other departments to promote economy, it is the business of this office to keep the public in the most essential questions of the war and the true position of affairs.

It is very difficult for the lay mind to grasp the principles on which the army and navy authorities exercise censorship. It must be remembered that the success of the operations and the lives of their soldiers often depend on these things. Only men engaged in such work day by day can say exactly what kinds of information may be of use to the enemy. Take the matter of mentioning the smaller fighting units which General Headquarters has decided against. We have found that the Germans, even when they have taken numbers of British prisoners, are not always wrong in some respects as to the composition of our army facing them. And in any case the German generals are always somewhat in doubt as to whether it can stand the acid test: "Will it benefit the enemy?"

The breaking down of old prejudices and old traditions in regard to publicity toward news is being done by the British press. Britain will see the game through with the daylight turned on and her cards on the table.

Empire's Ratified

Penetration

French Reconquest on Belgian Front, Reaching Into Enemy Lines

By Courier Leased Wire.
Paris, Aug. 10.—French last night made further progress against the German positions on the Belgian front. Frenchmen broke into the enemy lines, occupied several farms to the east of Bivsch and west of Langwarck, captured a number of machine guns, and gained a foothold in the region of Fayst. French statement says the result was repulsed except the centre where German elements attacked the French lines. Some enemy detachments, the French advanced trench.

In the course of the night the Germans also made violent attacks on the French lines between Fauter and Farme. Epine des Chevigny, on Aisne front. Some German detachments which penetrated French positions were killed or captured after hand-to-hand fighting.

Further German attacks, notably south of Aisne, on Aisne front, near Avoeux wood, in the Vesle region, northwest of Fliery, in Wever, were checked by French fire. The Germans are holding prisoners in the hands of the French.

The text of the statement re "In Belgium we continued to advance during the night. Our occupied several farms east of Fauter and Farme. We captured a number of machine guns.

"North of St. Quentin the Germans attacked our positions from a front of about one mile. Trenches were broken by our troops without losses, except at the where detachments of the French gained a foothold at weak points advanced trench elements.

"North of the Aisne the night marked by a receding of the German front in the entire region of Allement and Flain.

"About 4 o'clock the enemy violently attacked our positions and by shock troops attempted several assaults upon our lines. The greater part of the front of our precise fire stopped the invaders who sustained heavy losses. Some enemy detachments succeeded in penetrating our lines. They were either killed or captured hand to hand fighting in our soldiers displayed the admirable spirit. He maintained our positions and took 69 prisoners.

Austrian Statement
Vienna, Aug. 9, via London.
The official communication by the Austro-Hungarian army reads as follows:
"Army of Baron von Rohring on Hungarian eastern front. There developed yesterday in our favorable engagements captured two heights and northern Bukovina after days of hard fighting and heavy rain. Our cavalry is forward against Carahomona. The north there is no change of position."
