HAVE COME TO TERMS

Envoys Have All Agreed on What They Will Demand.

London, Nov. 26.—A Pekan despatch dated Nov. 24, Says:—The diplomatic body held a final meeting this morning and agreed on the terms of the prelaminary treaty. Nothing now remains except to secure the approval of the respective governments before definite negotiations with the Chinese peace commissioners are begun. The definite negotiations with the Chinese peace commissioners are begun. The precise terms of the settlement have not yet been made public here, but it is believed outside the diplomatic corps that the main points are in substantial agreement with those contained in the French note to the powers, namely, punishment for the guilty, indemnity to governments and individuals, retention of strong legation guards, and the occupation of certain places between Pekin and Taku.
