Mr. Brown possesses an easy and confident delivery, and a conversational style, which soon placed him on rapport with his audience. His evident mastery of his subject and his ability to intersperse amusing and entertaining incidents contributed a considerable element in his favor and makes the lecture exceedingly popular.

On Wednesday, Dec. 5, Mr. Brown will deliver his lecture in the Grand Opera House under the auspices of the Western City I. O. O. F. 93, and a matinee will be given at 3.30 in the afternoon for the school children.

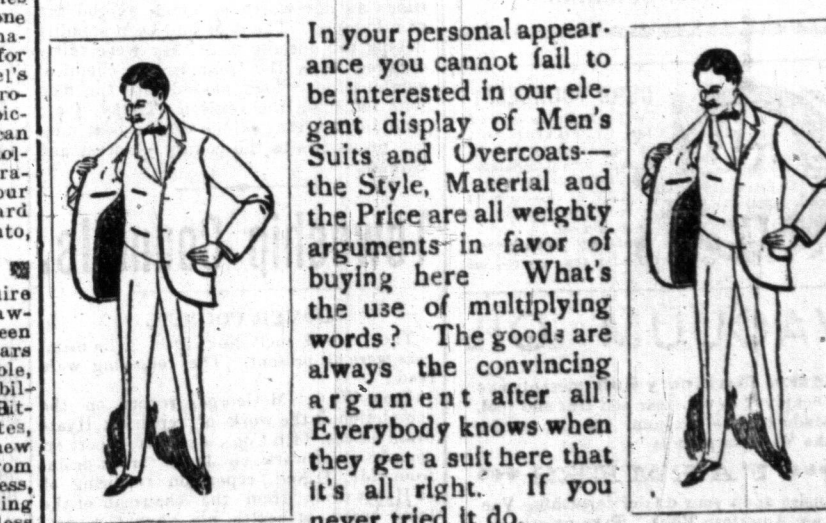
