HE EXPLAINS

Rev. Mr. Cobblewick Withdraws his Statements Regarding the Lacrosse Clubs.

As a preface to his sermon last evening, Rev. Mr. Cobblewick made the following statement concerning his reference to the Tecumseh Lacrosse Team:—

That there may be no mistake this time as to what I shall say, I have committed it to writing and will furnish a copy to representatives of the press if they wish it.

In the course of my sermon last Sunday evening on the subject, "The Prodigal Dead Broke," I referred to sports as one of the things which bring men to being dead broke financially, and referred by way of illustration to the tendency to run athletics into professional sports, and cited the Lacrosse Club as a case in point.

I deprecated the professionalizing of this kind of athletics and incidentally voiced the impression which seemed to be pretty general at the time and which I received from several, as I believed, reliable sources concerning some of the team.

I have been very glad to be personally assured since by those in close touch with the men through the season, that I was misinformed in two particulars, viz., that none of them ever gambled and that the reason some of them were not available for the final game was that they were sick.

I regret having, though unintentionally, done any man an injustice, and in the same spirit of candor in which I made the statement I wish to correct in those particulars and to say that I have learned the management were careful to secure only "clean men" for the team. Now that the personal element has been eliminated, I may be permitted to make plain what I aimed to call attention to in the first place, viz., the professionalizing of athletics. We all know something of the length to which this has been carried in the United States, in baseball, and the evils inseparably connected with it. Lacrosse, in Canada, is becoming almost as professional a game as baseball is across the line. It is therefore time for us to consider whether we should encourage this tendency, even for the sake of maintaining our supremacy in the game. I do not conceive it to be in the best interests of our city and of our land that we should; and as one who has endorsed amateur athletics in the city I have felt it to be my duty to draw, and to urge other to draw, a broad line of distinction between the proper use of athletics for physical development and the professionalizing of them as a means of livelihood.

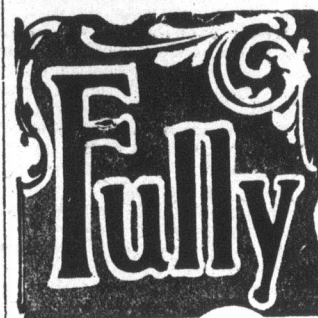
