Trees That Form Islands.
In the course of great rivers, islands h?" asked a fish dealer are generally formed by the stranding of trees, shrubs, plants and such things brought down by the current. In the Mackenzie river of Canada the whole process of island making in this way can be easily observed. Trees borne down from the banks by the undermining action of the current usually retain considerable mass of earth and stones entangled in their roots. They, therefore, readily sink, and by doing so form considerable shoals, which time converts into regular vegetable islands. Then a thicket of small willows covers the newly formed land and their fibrous roots serve to bind the whole firmly to gether. A peaty soil is formed by the gradual decay of the vegetation, including the trunks of the trees, and on this many new varieties of plants spring up. Sometimes the island clears its moorings and floats away down stream until it is again arrested by an obstacle, or it may become in a sense waterogged and subside close to the bottom. In this latter case it often gets covered over with mud and sand, which form a new and more permament land sur
