Local and Provincial.

Miss Eva Fuller, of Annapolis, graduated in the second class at the Truro Normal school, on the 23d ult.

There will be afternoon service in St John's church at 3 o'clock, which will be conducted by Rev. Dr. H. T. Hind, of Windsor.

Owing to an outbreak of diphtheria Aecia Villa Seminary, at Horton Landing, was closed on Tuesday. We trust the disease will be kept from spreading.

It is expected that there will be a return match on Saturday between the Wolfville baseball club and the College Club. No doubt an interesting game will be played.

The ship, "Kommander Svend Foyn," formerly the W. D. Lawrence, is loading coal at West Bay. This is the first time she has been in the basin since she was launched in 1874.

We have been asked to state that having been requested by a number of friends to do so, Prof. D. E. Woodman has consented to give a one mile walking exhibition this evening on the "cricket ground."

Blake," when about two days out from Hullo, Philippine Islands. The ship was put into Anjer, at which port the remains were buried, on the 25 inst., some three weeks after her death. The cablegram announcing the above gives no further particulars, though it was known that Mrs Faulkner had suffered from an attack of Cholera while at Hullo. Capt. and Mrs Faulkner have only been married a few years and were devotedly attached to each other. She was the eldest daughter of Mrs Alex. D. McKee, and sister of Mrs A. M. Hoare, of Halifax, also a sister-in-law of Mr I. Fred Carver, of this town. Some years ago she was a teacher in the public schools of Windsor, and was a great favorite among her large circle of acquaintances.—Windsor Tribune

We copy the following paragraph from the Hamilton, Bermuda, Royal Gazette, of April 21st. Mr Pitt was well known in our town and vicinity, being a yearly visitor here for some time. Many will learn of his death with regret.

Yesterday morning Mr Thos. H. Pitt died at his residence in this town in his 70th year. His funeral at Pembroke Parish Church Yard took place in the afternoon. The flags in port were half mast out of respect to his memory. Mr Pitt has for the last few years been removed from active business, and his declining health did not of late permit his appearing much in public. For a long period Mr Pitt has been honorably known among our Bermudian business men, having acquired from his early experiences abroad a training which stood him well throughout his long mercantile career.

After a time the bone was properly set with medical assistance and it is to be hoped he will soon recover.

Grand Division S. of T.

The second quarterly session of the Grand Division, S. of T., of Nova Scotia, met in Witter's Hall, Wolfville, on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The following officers were present: The Past Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Chaplain being unavoidably absent:— G. W. P.—Firman McClure, Truro, G. W. A.—E. H. Armstrong, Granville Ferry, G. Scribe, W. S. Saunders, Halifax City, G. Treas.—Henry A. Taylor, Halifax City, G. Cond.—J. H. Chambers, St Croix, Hants Co., G. Sent.—W. F. Horton, Halifax City.

The reports of the various officers and committees show the order to be in a good condition. During the past quarter 423 members have been added, the total membership now being 15,907. There are now 285 Divisions under the jurisdiction of the Grand Division,—a gain of three during the quarter. There have been 7 Bands of Hope organized during the quarter with 193 members. The total membership of Bands in the Province is now 2,885. During the session 21 representatives presented themselves and were duly initiated as members of the Grand Division. A large number of visitors were also present.

A pleasant feature of the meetings was a visit of "Crystal" Band of Hope on Tuesday afternoon. The young people were appropriately addressed by the G. W. P., G. S., G. Treas., and others.

On Tuesday evening a special meeting of Wolfville Division was held in their hall, at which the Grand Division and subordinate Divisions were present, and the hall was well filled. Interesting addresses were made by G. W. P. McClure, G. Scribe Saunders, P. G. W. P. Parsons, G. W. A. Armstrong, G. Conductor Chambers and others. An appropriate selection of music was rendered by a choir of Wolfville Division, and ice-cream and other refreshments were provided. The session closed on Wednesday afternoon and was pronounced a very successful and enjoyable one by those present.
