

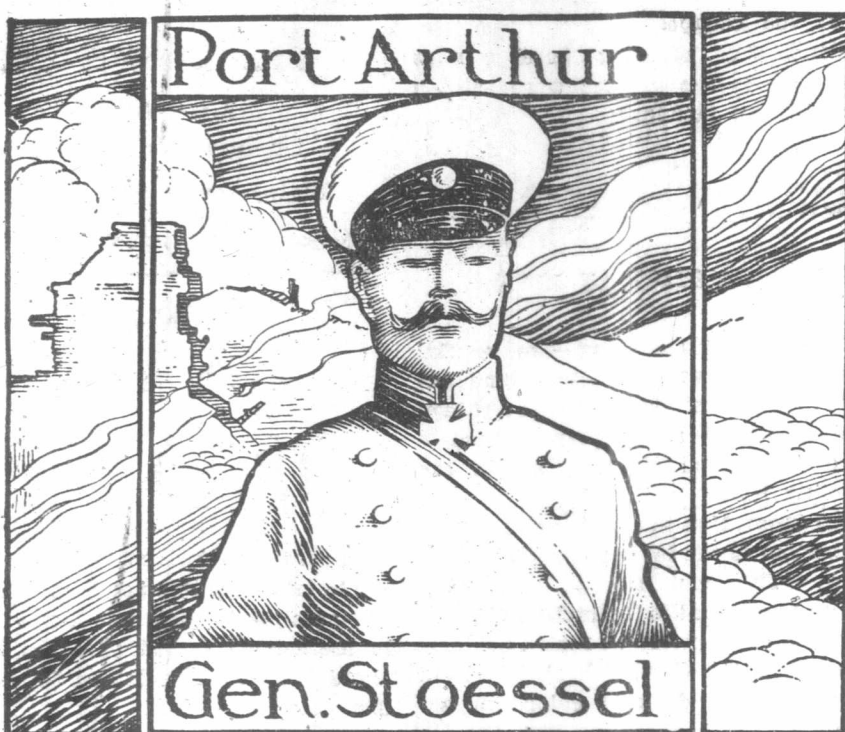

Herring Fishery

(Western Star.)

The herring fishery for this season is about over. All the vessels had loaded and sailed at the end of the week except the Marion Mosher, at Middle Arm, with about enough herring ashore to finish her load. She has no doubt finished before this. Captain S. Shaw in the Weshever, takes away the first frozen cargo this season and was at Woods Island the last of the week ready to sail. The Helen Vair with a cargo of pickled herring, was also at Woods Island ready to sail to North Sydney.

The schooner Evelyn Miller with a cargo of Scotch cured herring for S. Sklaroff & Sons, was loaded and waiting the arrival of a new fore-sail from St. John's. This arrived on Saturday night and the vessel got away yesterday.

The schooner Aviator loaded at North Arm for Bay of Islands Fisheries Co. The only other vessel here now is the Mark Grey. She is chartered to take away a cargo of Scotch cured herring. There is considerable herring not shipped yet, and it is expected that the Sagona and Portia will each take away a cargo. The Stella Maris is also scheduled to make another trip here. She will not likely reach Curling unless weather conditions change considerably, and will therefore load at Middle Arm. The balance of the herring at Curling will likely be shipped by rail. Max Jacobs shipped two cargoes by rail yesterday. E. Baggs Ltd. and A. M. Dunphy shipped a quantity of split herring by the schooner Helen Vair.

All the returns for the herring fishery in Bay of Islands this season are not in yet and therefore the total catch is not definitely known, and will not be until the balance of the catch is shipped, but it is estimated that the total catch has been between thirty-five and forty thousand barrels for all kinds. Of this amount about half were put up by Scotch style. The packers have paid great attention and endeavored to put an article on the market, and the fish have gone forward in excellent condition. There has also been some considerable improvements of late in the package used, and large percentage of the barrels used this year have had all iron hoops, which tend considerably to their durability.

WILL HOLD CHURCH PARADE

A special meeting of the Star of the S. Association was held on Sunday afternoon, when it was decided that the annual Church parade would be held on Sunday next, the Society attending Mass at St. Patrick's Church. Through the generosity of Messrs. Jos. Murphy and W. H. Jackman two bands will be engaged for the occasion and it is expected the parade will be the largest in the history of the Society.

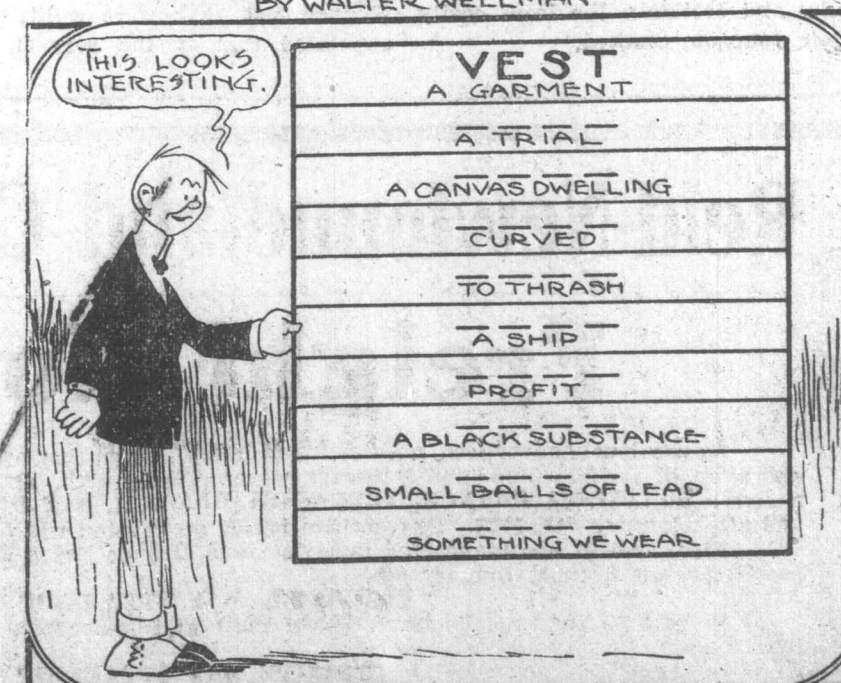
