IMPROVEMENTS AT FLORENCEVILLE

Premier Veniot Takes Up Project of Wiring Bridge—New Sidewalks?

Florenceville, March 18—The Florenceville Institute held their regular monthly meeting at the home of Mrs. W. P. Hagerman on Tuesday evening. The president, Mrs. Wilbur Taylor, was in the chair. There were 16 members present and two visitors.

The meeting passed a resolution favoring the abolition of the production and sale of oleomargarine in Canada. The wiring of the bridge came up for discussion, and it is hoped that Premier Veniot will proceed with this work with all speed. He is now in communication with D. H. Shanks. The matter of building sidewalks in Florenceville was discussed. As the first step a committee of three namely Mrs. Wilbur Taylor, Mrs. W. H. Fowler and Mrs. A. D. McCain were appointed to wait on Mr. Earnest McClary, the road supervisor and ask that he spend 40 per cent of the road tax money on the sidewalks as provided by law. By skirting the walk and applying a substantial coat of gravel a great improvement would be effected.

Acting on the suggestion of the principal of the school, H. P. Hovey, it was decided to appoint two institute members to visit the school each month. Mrs. A. D. McCain and Mrs. H. H. McCain were appointed for March. All members will be glad to hear that the institute dishes which were lost at the July 12th celebration have been replaced by the Orangemen, and are now in the care of the secretary. The program consisted of a demonstration and paper. Mrs. H. H. McCain gave a demonstration on "Carrot Pie" and a delectable portion was enjoyed by each of the members. Mrs. Hartley Boyer gave a paper on "Remunerative Hand work" and also showed some examples of work with coarse cotton, which were much admired. The hostess served delicious refreshments, assisted by Mesdames Fowler and Boyer. Miss Flo Armstrong, who is the guest of her mother gave several piano solos which were much enjoyed. God Save the King closed the meeting. The April meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Murray Smith.

Just what great strain he labored under in preaching to a packed house that night none can know. 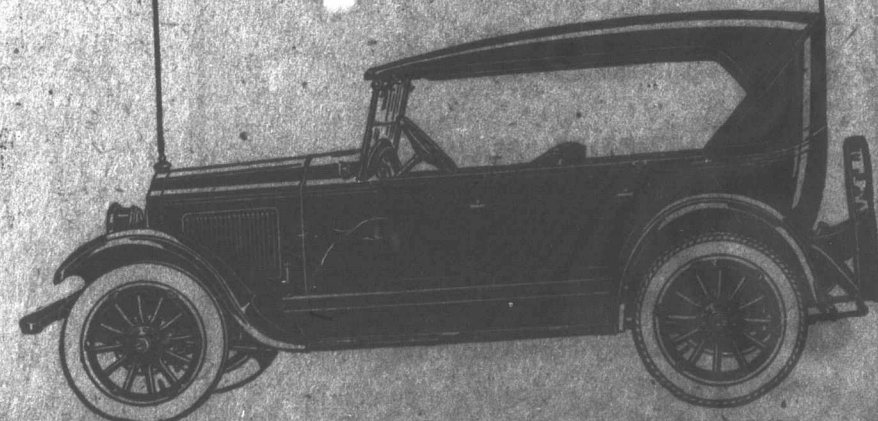
