—Miracle of Josephine holding Court
in the morning to the costumiers
and ordering her wardrobe in such
endless profusion that the bills
caused no end of trouble between
herself and the Little Corporal, and
no little ingenuity was required on
her part to get a suit worn even
once, when it was discarded. Had
Josephine lived three-quarters of a
century later her despair would have
been absolute to select out of the
multitude of prevailing fashions
and styles—a wealth and abundance
that have grown out of the multi-
plicity of modern invention and
machinery. Unfortunately, in the
race between human invention and
good taste the former has "got
away" with the latter; nothing can
be more grotesque than some of the
fashionable styles of the day. Paris
sent forth some months ago an ex-
tended bustle—a sort of plateau
formation, and notwithstanding its
manifest absurdity, it has taken like
fire to the health and run all over
the European capitals and now
threatens to devastate the West even
to the fastness of the wilderness.
The immense rail and fardingle, in
which Queen Bess concealed her-
self when she went to St. Paul's to
see the statue for the defeat of the
Spanish Armada, has afforded an
amusement to all succeeding genera-
tions, but it is not a whit more un-
natural than the collection of skirts
and steel that follow a fashionable
woman on her rounds. We are told
the human form divine is a master-
piece of beauty; its lines and
curves and motions are a perfection
of grace. The Greeks gave us
canons of beauty that modern crit-
icism pronounce faultless, yet we de-
part more and more from those
chaste and simple folds of drapery
they taught us and hide the human
form beneath a bulging deformity of
cotton jeans and steel wires.

—The estimate of canvas fabrics
introduced last year were very largely
used this season with colored em-
broidery in small flower sprays all
over them, as blue corn-fowers or
red carnations on an even ground
of white. The new fashions in
dresses are using heavy mohairs and
alpaca for travelling dresses. These
come in gray, ecru, and tan brown
and are made up in the
severe tailor styles that are in vogue
with the latest English fashions.

For Canada temperature a wool
dress is the best choice, and should
be of pure wool, unmix with silk
or linen, that it may not cockle if
suddenly dampened; the rough
open-ribbed dress and the Che-
voits of light weight are most used
for general wear, while French
cashmere is worn by brides or by
those who object to the rough goods.
Stripes, checks, cross-bars, and the
like are the design of the day.
The English rough cloth is most used
for travelling cloaks. The loose Raglan
with square sleeves is the favorite
shape for those who want a garment
that is easily put on and off. For
place figures the shirred pelisse is a
graceful garment, and may be
long enough to envelop the wearer,
and entirely cover and protect the
travelling dress beneath.

The straight, high English collar
of linen with square corners broken
over slightly and a row of very
delicate embroidery is the favorite
choice. To this there is sometimes
added a small shield-like piece in
front, serving as a chemise with
open-throated dress waists.

Low shoes, with black or very
dark blue, brown, or red stockings,
will be worn out-of-doors more than
they have been at any previous
time. These shoes are the rough
(low, pointed) toes, thicker soles
than are used for house shoes, and
the preference with ladies who fol-
low English fashions is for low
heels, though French heels are still
worn in moderation. Patent-leather
remains in favor for such shoes, but
will be more often used merely for
the vamp, while the uppers are kid,
instead of having the whole of
patent-leather.

Ladies obtain fuller infor-
