J. FRED BENSON OF CHATHAM DEAD

The whole community was shocked Thursday morning to learn of the death of J. Fred Benson which took place at his home, 730 a. m. While he had not been in his best health for several months he had been around attending to business as usual. On Saturday he became ill and although confined to his home was not considered serious until Wednesday night when two physicians were summoned but despite all they could do Mr. Benson gradually grew worse and passed away. He was in his forty-eighth year and was a son of the late James Benson of this town and a nephew of the late Drs. Joseph and John B. Benson who were prominent North Shore physicians. Mr. Benson is survived by one sister, Miss Sophie G., at home, and one brother, William, manager of the Bank of Montreal, Paris. The late J. Fred Benson was one of Chatham's most prominent citizens, having served his town for many years at its council board with distinction. At one time he was a member of the county council. In politics he always was a staunch Liberal. In 1896 he opened a job printing establishment and in 1898 he published The Commercial, of which he was managing editor. He continued in this enterprise until January of this year when the business was turned into a joint stock company called The Commercial Press, Limited, of which Mr. Benson was elected managing director. He held this office until his death. He was a prominent member of St. Mary's Episcopal church. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, interment being in St. Paul's cemetery.
