Almost 9000 Canadians who had been residents of the United States for a period longer than 6 months have returned to Canada during the menths of April and May according to figures announced by the Department of Immigration and Colonization.

It was only at the end of March that the immigration officials at the 171 entry points along the border began to check returning Canadians who had been in the United States longor than 6 months. In April 148 of these points where immigration officials are stationed reported that 4084 Canadians had returned to their own country.
