The Marchand Loan.

The Marchand Government proposes to add \$1,500,000 to the bonded debt of the Province. The resolutions author izing such action will come with certain painful surprise to those of the electors who thought that with the advent to power of a Liberal administration there would be an end to the borrowings on the nearly exhausted credit of Quebec. The Government's policy is an unwise one. It is more it is dangerous. The case is not one to justify more borrowing and another permanent increase in the interest burden of a cebt already so large that the premier-treasurer's own statements show, the revenue cannot bear it and meet the costs of the administrative services. To put the case simply, the requirements of the expenditure are larger than the revenue will meet. I Mr. Marchand's Government cannot reduce the outgo it should augment the income. If it has not the courage to do this it is unfit for the duty that confronts it. Mr. Marchand's attempt to hold the Flynn and Tallion Governments responsible for his borrowing will fool no one. It is in bad faith in a louble sense. Mr. Flynn showed in his address how the outgo of last year had been swelled and the revenue starved for the purpose of making a seeming excuse for a bigger loan.
