PARIS, To-day.
Canadian Postmaster General Pelletier arrived here. The principal object of his visit is to arrange, if possible, for a reduction in cable rates and for introducing of two cent postage between Canada and France. The Postmaster General will be joined on Saturday by his colleagues Doherty and Hazen. Hazen will confer with M. Delcasse, French Minister of Marine, on subject of reciprocal shipping regulations, notably with respect to increase the number of life boats on steamships plying between France and Canada. Great importance is attached to the visit to Paris of Canadian Ministers on account of close race-ties between France and Canada.

LONDON, To-day.
The Daily Mail's parliamentary correspondent declares in an open secret that the Canadian Premier and his colleagues are prepared to recommend a contribution of \$20,000,000 to build three Dreadnoughts, but that nothing can be announced until Ministers return to Canada. The Daily Mail believes this knowledge influenced the British Government in preparing the recent Naval estimates, that Grey also had it in mind when said in the House of Commons yesterday: "There were forces at work which would influence expenditure on armaments."

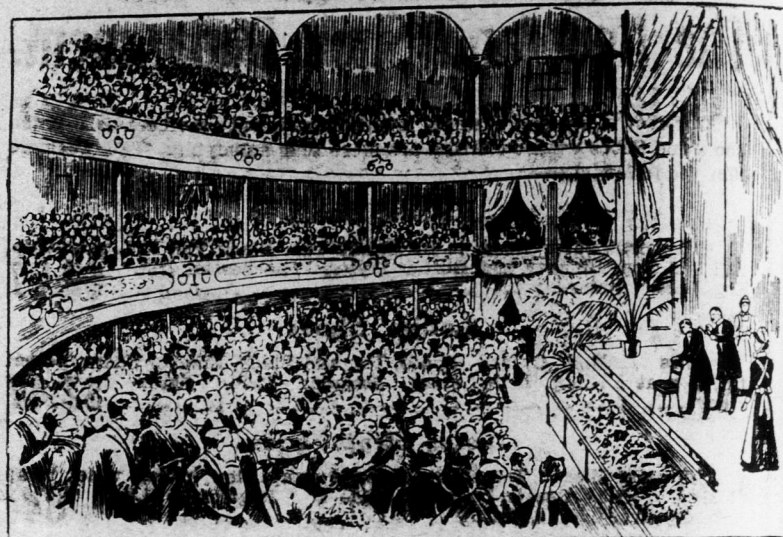
