The Postmaster General will be joined on Saturday by his colleagues Doherty and Hazen. Hazen will confer with M. Delcasse, French Minister of Marine, on subject of reciprocal shipping regulations, notably with respect to increase the number of life boats on steamships plying between France and Canada. Great importance is attached to the visit to Paris of Canadian Ministers on account of close race ties between France and Canada.


