## Cable News.

CHRISTIANIA, June 12.—The Storting has unanimously agreed to extend female suffrage to all women, irrespective of income.

LISBON, June 12.—Many were killed or wounded today by the explosion of a dynamite bomb, thrown from a window at a passing procession.

COPENHAGEN, June 12.—King Christian today accepted the resignation of his Danish Premier and Cabinet, whose party was defeated at the recent elections.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Free raw wool immediately and free raw sugar in three years, were approved by the majority of the Senate Finance Committee today.

TANGIER, June 12.—A state of panic prevails at Tetuan, and the Resident General has forbidden anyone except the guards to appear in the streets after 9 p.m. Moors, dressed as women, have been killing people in various sections, and panic prevails.

LIVERPOOL, June 12.—The explosion of a canister caused excitement today at Runcorn, midway between Manchester and this city, where it was thrown in the street from the window of a street car, when crossing the suspension bridge over the ship canal. It burst with a loud report. Outrages again.

BELGRADE, June 12.—The Serbian Government today sent a note to the Bulgarian Government, proposing that three-fourths of the armies of Bulgaria and Serbia be demobilized in order to relieve the existing tension, and to facilitate a settlement of the differences existing between the two governments.

NEW YORK, June 12.—A cable to the American says Sir Edward Grey has handed his resignation to Mr. Asquith, who has refused it. The announcement is claimed to be made on high authority. At the moment Sir Edward has come to no further decision, but it is certain that he will resign shortly, as he considers the present scandals affecting certain members of the Cabinet, reflect indirectly on himself.

LONDON, June 12.—In the House of Commons last night, Premier Asquith, in refusing the demand of the Labor members to abolish taxes on food (peas, tea, etc.) and to substitute taxes on unearned increment and large estates, reminded the Labour men that it was the duty of workers to bear a fair share of the country's expenses, because they were benefitted by the Army, Navy, Civil Service and other Government departments, as much as any other class.

ROME, June 12.—A moving picture machine was set up in the Consistorial Hall of the Vatican yesterday. The Pope, surrounded by his sisters and nieces, the Papal Secretary of State and other dignitaries of the Vatican, enjoyed the interesting scenes displayed. He watched the show with animation, and at the end called attention to the progress of science, which permitted the unfolding of the wonders of the world before even a prisoner like himself.

LONDON, June 12.—Scandals connecting members of the British Government with speculations in oil may, it is reported bring about, a fresh parliamentary sensation. The Times recently warned the Government that rumors were rife that the Cabinet ministers were speculating in oil shares of companies which were under contract for naval supplies. The Globe today hints that the books of Charles E. Fenner, the stock-broker, who recently went into bankruptcy, show that Lord Murray, of Ellbank, invested considerable Liberal party funds in oil shares, particularly in those of a Mexican Company, which had obtained large Government contracts.

NEW YORK, June 12.—The Tribune says the interim report of the Marconi Parliamentary Committee will be circulated tomorrow, or Saturday. In addition to the majority report there will be a minority report signed by the Unionist members of the Committee. Bonar Law, on Monday, will ask for a day for discussion, which will meet with instant acceptance. Upon the attitude of Premier Asquith interest centres, as any deviation from his uncompromising support of his colleagues may have critical consequences. The Tribune correspondent believes that the interim report will be less condemnatory in tone than the original draft prepared by Sir Albert Spicer, and that it will neither condemn nor definitely acquit ministers of their dealing in Marconi stocks, offering no opinion as to the propriety of these transactions, but that it will definitely acquit those concerned of corruption.

## Savage Dogs

Destroying Property.

A pack of hungry dogs which did so much destruction at Petty Harbour and around the extreme West End, are again engaged at slaughtering. Five of these savage brutes have migrated to Signal Hill and during the past week they have destroyed a considerable number of hens and other poultry. Residents of that section owing live property, are intending to use powder and shot for protection. Anyway time and again children are bitten, and in the interests of the public these pests should be exterminated.

## Mtd. Vocalist.

The Montreal Star of the 7th inst., publishes a very fine picture of Mr. John J. O'Reilly, of this city, who is now in Montreal, and has this to say about him:—

"J. J. O'Reilly, tenor and pupil of the Plamondon-Michot School of Singing, will be heard on the 16th of this month at the Y. M. C. A., where the pupils of E. Taranto, teacher of violin, will give their annual concert.

Mr. O'Reilly is a native of St. John's, Newfoundland. Cello numbers will be played by Gustave Labelle, of the McGill Conservatorium of Music." Mr. O'Reilly who while here in St. John's was prominent in musical circles is now making his mark in Montreal. He is a son of Mr. P. J. O'Reilly, wine dealer, of Water Street East, was formerly a member of the C. C. C. Band, and during the summer will come here on a vacation.

## Paper Cannon.

To the amazing long list of articles made of paper there may be added paper cannon, which have been manufactured at the Krupp works in Germany. These paper field pieces are for special use of the infantry. Their calibre is a little less than two inches, and the pieces are so light that a soldier can easily carry one. But the resistance is greater than that of a field piece of steel of the same calibre. It is not to be understood that these paper guns are in any way to replace those made of steel. The paper arms are intended merely for uses in situations where the movement of field artillery would be impracticable. Paper artillery on the field of battle seems an extraordinary thing; but it is hardly more so than paper wheels for freight cars on railways appeared when they were first introduced, or, for that matter, than paper water-pails were.
