Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
VANCOUVER, To-day.
The battleship cruiser New Zealand reached Esquimaux yesterday from Honolulu, and will stay here until Saturday. She will go to Vancouver and remain a week.

CHRISTIANA, Norway, To-day.
The steamer Grosser Kurfurst arrived from Spitzbergen waters and reports that recent wireless despatches reached the vessel from Tromsø, indicating that Adolf, Schrodler Stranz was missing. That the German Arctic explorer had been rescued, was erroneous, was stated by the officers of the vessel. The despatch sent from the Grosser Kurfurst was based on the rumor picked up off Spitzbergen for which there was no foundation.

LONDON, To-day.
An important development in the Balkan situation was the demand presented by the Austrian representative at Athens and Belgrade for immediate cessation of hostilities together with the warning that Austria will not allow Bulgaria to be greatly humiliated, declared at Vienna last night. Should Greece and Serbia still oppose the armistice, the Rumanian army, acting as a mandatory of Austria and Russia will prevent any attack on Sofia and Austria will take even more energetic steps if necessary to stop the war. Should it be true, Austria and Russia thus have agreed to co-operate and the pressure exercised doubtless will be effective. In the military sphere the principal news is that the Serbians have invested the fortress of Vidin, Bulgaria, situated on the Danube, 130 miles South of Belgrade. The fall of the fortress cannot long be delayed in fact a Belgrade despatch reports General Kutuncheff's troops already beginning to surround Vidin, which is a population of fifteen thousand and will be Serbia's biggest capturing during the war. No news was received from the Turkish side but it is reported the Porte has ordered the mobilization of three army corps in Asia Minor.

Outer Cove Notes.

The other day it was stated that it was the Torbay men who made the 9:20 time over the course at the Regatta 23 years ago. That was a mistake. It was an Outer Cove crew which made that record.
Complaints are very general about the favoritism shown in the giving out of road work. Liberals are passed over or given very little work, while Tories are favoured by getting as high as \$30 for road work. Not that they do the work well. The road in Outer Cove were never in such a bad state as at present, although never so much money was being spent on the roads. Now we have three road inspectors. Isn't it time they were up and about and seeing that the road gains the benefit of the money spent. Good roads are good for everybody. Bad road work shows that the money is largely thrown away.
Favoritism is shown also in the use of the horse which is used for hauling dories. A grant is made for the work, but Liberals are not given a fair show. Bond men are refused the use of the horse. The grant was made for the benefit of all the fishermen, not for a favored few. A lot of the dory masters sent in a complaint to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. But they can get no redress. Next fall the story will be different. We are not on turning out the Morris gang and then we shall have a chance of a square deal.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
SASKATON, To-day.
The town of Brock, Sask., was wiped out by fire yesterday. The fire started in a barn, and spread under a high wind. The fire brigade has just left for Kindersley. The town is still burning.

BRUSSELS, To-day.
The first international Congress for the protection of childhood opened yesterday in this city and was attended by official delegates from thirty-five nations, who unanimously decided upon the creation of an international office at Brussels where the work of all nations in this connection will be centred.

LONDON, To-day.
By all the main roads entering into London, there came last evening an invasion of non-militant suffragettes, who, during the past few weeks, have been on a pilgrimage from all parts of the country carrying banners. The women formed a picturesque procession. On their arrival at the capital they held a meeting in an open place. To-day they will attend services at St. Paul's Cathedral and afterwards hold a demonstration in Hyde Park.

SHANGHAI, To-day.
Despite the negotiations made yesterday afternoon for an armistice, fighting was resumed at nine o'clock last evening. The South Chinese were reinforced by 500 Cantonese also 100 Hunanese and again attacked the arsenal but were defeated with considerable losses. The forces at the mouth of the river have now joined the Loyalists and the city presents an extraordinary appearance, fires are blazing in the outskirts of the native city and thousands are homeless. The Chinese refugees are camping in the streets. The roofs of houses and warehouses are being set on fire by foreigners are watching the fighting.

PEKING, To-day.
The news received here from Shanghai is regarded as the revolt is considered satisfactory. The government is sending one brigade, the President's Body Guard, to the scene of hostilities, leaving only one brigade at Peking. Other troops are also proceeding South on the Tien Tsin Pukow railway in order to avert the danger of Chang Hsun transferring allegiance to Southerners. It is reported troops made a sortie last night under the protection of gun fire from the arsenal and the gun boats. They scattered many rebels who attempted to enter the French concession but were driven back by foreign volunteers. The marines are evidently without weapons. The rebels occupied across country. Admiral Asem, in command of the fleet which still remains loyal, demanded the rebels to surrender at Wu Sung forts. He threatened otherwise to attack them with his vessels. The exodus from the Chinese quarter was tremendous owing to a report that the Southern General, Cheng Chi Mei, one of those for whose life the Provisional President Yuan Shi Kai has proclaimed a reward, intended to burn the city. The refugees who, when unarmed, were admitted to the foreign concessions are now sleeping in the open air.

The S.S. Prospero is at Sydney getting bunker coal. She sails to-night for Hongkong and Canton.
The S.S. Portia left St. Joseph's at 8:25 a.m. to-day going west.
