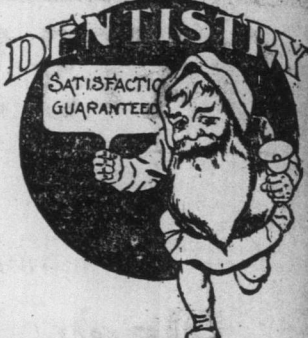

**British Submarines  
Doing Their Bit.**

Although German warships do not  
patrol the North Sea and never ven-  
ture from their bases except to raid  
minor British seaports when atmos-  
pheric conditions are favourable, or to  
attack a convoy reported by air scouts,  
the British submarines, of whose per-  
formances so little is heard, have  
succeeded, according to an official  
statement, in attacking successfully  
no less than forty German war ves-  
sels.

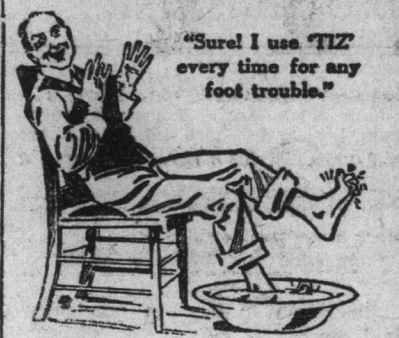
The enemy has always had targets  
for his torpedoes in the North Sea,  
the English Channel, the Irish Sea,  
and in the waters north of Scotland  
and Ireland. Early in the war the bat-  
tle-ship Formidable, the armoured  
cruisers Hogue, Cressy, and Aboukir,  
and the light cruisers Hawke and  
Pathfinder were sunk by German sub-  
marines in the North Sea. The repu-  
tation the German Navy won for ef-  
fective work with its U-boats against

British war vessels was the reward of  
skill more than of extraordinary dar-  
ing; nevertheless, the lesson taught  
was that the only safe place for the  
battle fleet was at its protected base,  
and it must be said that the prestige  
of the British submarine flotilla suf-  
fered little if not its own opportu-  
nities by acts of intrepidity that were  
sometimes almost incredible.

To attack German warships, except  
in the two or three fights that oc-  
curred in the North Sea, it was ne-  
cessary for the British submarines to  
invade the Baltic, an enterprise of  
considerable danger. The Prinz Adal-  
bert, an armoured cruiser of 3,558 tons,  
was sunk on Oct. 23, 1915; the protect-  
ed cruiser Bremen, 3,300 tons, on Dec.  
17, 1915; and the light cruiser Un-  
dine, 2,672 tons, on Dec. 7, 1915. When  
the protected cruiser Hela, 2,003 tons,  
was sunk earlier in the war, Sept. 9,  
1914, Lieutenant Max Horton's ex-  
ploits had been called exceptionally  
bold and difficult, because a great  
storm was raging at the time and he  
was operating in the enemy's waters  
near Heligoland.

The really great, daring shown by  
British submarine officers, proving  
their quality in the face of what  
seemed to be insuperable obstacles, was  
displayed in Turkish waters. On Dec.  
13, 1914, Lieutenant Holbrook, ran  
through five lines of mines in the Bar-  
danelles and torpedoed the Turkish  
battleship Mesoudieh. He received  
the Victoria Cross for his achievement.  
Lieut. Commanders Edward Boyle and  
Eric Naismith were similarly hono-  
red for even greater triumphs over the  
Turko-German defenses. Boyle divered  
under minefields to get into the Sea of  
Marmora, where he sank two Turkish  
gunboats and one large transport fill-  
ed with troops. Naismith raided the  
Sea of Marmora up to the wharves of  
Constantinople, one of which he blew  
up with a torpedo, and before he re-  
turned through the Dardanelles he had  
destroyed one large gunboat, three  
transports, and five store ships.

What the youngsters of the British  
flotillas demonstrated in the early  
part of the war was that they were  
willing to take desperate chances to  
accomplish anything worth recording.  
If there had been a regular German  
patrol in the North Sea, British sub-  
marines would have taken heavy toll.  
But it was not supposed until the of-  
ficial statement previously referred to  
was published that the British hornets  
had such a big score as forty enemy  
warships. Most of them have, of  
course, been destroyed and other light  
craft engaged in raiding and recon-  
noissances.

In one case a British submarine ran  
into mine-laid Heligoland and tor-  
pedoed a returned U-boat as she was  
tying up. In the light of Heligoland  
two armed auxiliaries were sent to the  
bottom. The mouths of the Ems and  
Weser have been invaded. The Brit-  
ishers could not be kept away by  
minefields or shot out of the Baltic.  
The narrative is one of taking great  
risks, going almost everywhere and at-  
tacking the enemy without rocking the  
odds. It is obvious that if German  
warships would contract the habit of  
steaming up and down the North Sea  
the British submarines, ever venture-  
some and alert, would run up a big  
score.—N. Y. Times.

**ICE BLOCKADE.**—The s.s. Home  
was compelled to run back to Lewis-  
porte on account of the heavy ice that  
is pressing in on the shore in Green  
Bay. The Clyde wharf is also al-  
ready at Lewisporte from the Twilling-  
gate route, reports that as far as can  
be seen northward there is not a lake  
of water in sight. Over 200 icebergs  
were counted on Monday by the light-  
keeper at Twillingate, Long Point.  
Another large field of ice has come  
south of Cape Freels and is packing  
in close on the north side of Bon-  
avista Bay.
