Ludendorff's Threat.

Copenhagen, Nov. 29.-People of prominence in Vienna who are in touch with the foreign department there, assert that in 1917, when Count Czernin, then Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, sought, by Emperor Charles, to induce Emperor William to conclude peace, he was referred to supreme headquarters.

When Count Czernin pointed out that Austria was exhausted and might be compelled to make a separate peace, General Ludendorff, striking

the table, exclaimed: "The same day that Austria concludes a separate peace, it will receive a declaration of war from Germany. That will be our only answer to such a breach." Count Czernin thereupon returned to Vienna and told the Emperor that nothing could be done, as Austria's fate was indissolubly knitted with that of Germany.
