Then he moved northward and finally reached Moscow, traversing the territory to which American food was sent. On the way he sent cabled reports, giving first-hand information of conditions in the famine district.

In the appended article, he describes in detail the conditions he observed in Batum and Tiflis. of the Associated Press).-Entrance into Russia through the Black Sea may be compared to a visit to a dreaded battle front. There's lots of fear of death and destruction, but semehow one does not find them: These elements to uneasy sleep seem along.
