Why Babies Cry

ONE OF THE SENSATIONS OF BODILY ACTIVITY.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—"Crying is one of the sensations of bodily activity," like kicking and stretching, and are naturally pleasurable to a baby, and it is the business of mother and nurse to see that nature's plans are not interfered with.

This new light on one of the problems facing parents and nurses was shed by Dr. Evelyn Saywell, of Harley Street, one of the first authorities on child culture when he lectured in London on the "Psychology of Infancy."

"Life is made too easy for a baby," said Dr. Saywell, "if by the magic of crying he can obtain his own way, and his natural development is retarded." He bawled over discomforts which a puppy or a kitten will endure in silence.

"Those who handle a child should from the first teach him to face reality. Parents should allow a child to take risks, for the safety-first policy is apt to kill the spirit of adventure and weaken the desire for achievement."

"The baby who tumbles about freely rarely hurts himself, while the one who is constantly warned about hurting himself tightens his muscles through fear, and so may be injured when he falls."

"No infant should be called 'naughty' or even be blamed for his mistakes, while too young to know the difference between right and wrong. I believe that the tortures suffered by many grown-up people over what they regard as their 'wickedness' are due to the confusion between wrongdoing and mistakes created in their minds during babyhood."

Britain's Trusteeship for Other Races

"As a result of long experience I assert my conviction that in the discharge of their respective duties and occupations, the merchants of England, and those to whom the task of government is entrusted in our tropical dependencies, from the least to the highest, need fear no comparison with the merchants or officials of any other nation or of any other epoch in the world's history."
Sir Frederick Lugard.

"The control of the tropics is not a mere question of profit to the working classes or any other class in this country. It is a question of national honour, and national destiny and national responsibility," said Sir Frederick Lugard, G.C.M.G., in a speech recorded in the Guardian.
"Trusteeship is not a mere sentimental expression of what is called the 'Humanitarian Conscience.' It does not ignore the claims of the congested populations of Europe to share in the bounties of nature in the tropics, or the first and proper claim of those who have spent capital and effort in development to reap their reward."

"It holds that that development should be undertaken in such a way as to benefit the people of the country equally with others. It recognizes the prior claim of the people of the soil to the land and its products, so far as they are required to meet their needs and their future expansion."

"It maintains the right of the producer to sell his produce in the best market and to benefit from the competition, which will assure to him the world's price for his commodities, and the right of the labourer to sell his labour to the best employer, if he desires to do so."

"The Power which accepts the obligations of a trustee is, moreover, charged with the duty of assisting the evolution of each native community, according to the stage to which it has already attained, by a system of education adapted to the needs; by improved methods of sanitation, and measures for the prevention or eradication of disease, and the decrease of infant mortality; by introducing such systems of government as will foster a sense of responsibility and public service in the leaders and eradicate the servile habit of mind among the people."

"On the economic side the preservation of forest resources, instruction in better methods of agriculture, improved varieties of crops, improved means of transport, better implements, and better preparation of produce for the market, must go hand in hand with research for the destruction of insects, pests and fungoid diseases of plants."

"Prospects of railway and harbour construction and of irrigation, and the demand for wage labour for European plantations must be limited to what can be reasonably met without harmful results to the native population. The prosecution of these aims should be outside the sphere of polemics in order to maintain a consistent continuity of national policy."
