DECLINED WITH THANKS.—M. Henri Rochefort, a French critic of some note, recently wrote, in the course of a criticism upon a picture by Gerome of the execution of Marshal Ney, that no one ever merited death more than Ney, and in going over to the standard of Napoleon after the Emperor's return from Elba he acted from ambition than from patriotism. For this he was challenged by Gen.
