A. D. Passmore, formerly of the Windsor High School, has been appointed teacher in the Upper Canada College.

W. Bray, Wallace Temple, Thos. Glasco, R. Newman, F. Coyne, F. Deamaria and P. Thillie, all union tailors, in Windsor, were arrested on Saturday night charged with having taken part in a brutal assault shortly after midnight Saturday night upon Wm. McElin. McElin is a non-union tailor and has since the attack been employed by Latham & Pownville, and although he has been approached by the union men a number of times he has refused to leave his job. Of late some of the union men have made threats of his life, and he has again had to tell them that if he would not walk out of town they would send him in a coffin. Late Saturday night McElin was going home, and when on Pitt street he was hit by a car driven by some person and rendered unconscious. His assailants then jumped on him and kicked him on the head and face, cutting him in a frightful manner.

Mrs. James Manson, aged 83, died on Thursday in Malden.

An interesting occurrence took place on Sunday evening in Saint's Church, Windsor, being a night church service for the children of the little daughter, Helen Major, of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Johnson, of Little Rock, Arkansas.

The interest chiefly lay in the fact of the little being the grandchild of the Rev. Canon Johnson, who performed the ceremony, and the water used on the occasion being from the River Jordan, Holy Land.

Wm. Lister, of the Windsor police force, registered his name at headquarters in Detroit when the Grand Army was there. A few days ago he received from Washington a blank application for a pension to fill up and return the address given. William's warlike experience has been confined to running in a few chaperoneous persons around Windsor, and he couldn't understand why he should receive a pension from the United States Government. The explanation is that at the beginning of the Civil War, Policeman Lister had an uncle William living in Toronto who enlisted. His funeral was attended by a large body of Orangemen marching in front, followed by 100 conveyances. The deceased served as a courier all through the rebellion of 1837 carrying dispatches.

Patrick J. Dewan, another old resident, passed away at his residence on the 8th concession of Biddulph, adjacent to the celebrated Cebor school house. His remains were followed to the Roman Catholic cemetery on Friday by a very large number of friends.
