Toronto, Oct. 6-11 p.m.—The tropical
storm mentioned on Friday as being between
Bermuda and the mainland, is now central
near Sable Island, and a heavy north-east
gale is blowing along the east coast of Nova
Scotia. Another storm center is near Lake
Superior, and will probably move across the
lake region. The weather today has been
fine everywhere but in Nova Scotia, where it
has been showery.
