Grand Trunk Changes—Arrest of a Former C. P. R. Assistant Paymaster.

Mr. Fitzhugh, secretary to Mr. Hays, the general manager of the G. T. R., has been appointed master of transportation, and will enter on his duties at once.

Mr. F. J. Watson, travelling freight agent, with headquarters at Montreal, has been appointed to a general clerkship in Hamilton, and will be succeeded by Mr. J. E. Hawkins.

Harry L. Noad, formerly assistant paymaster of the C. P. R., was arrested in New York on a charge of stealing \$5,000 from one of the company's pay cars.

It is now settled that Edmund E. Wragge, now in charge of the transportation company at Toronto, will be replaced by E. H. Fitzhugh, of Montreal, who will begin his duties on Wednesday next. Mr. Wragge retires from the G. T. R.

The traffic returns on the Canadian Pacific Railway for the week ended July 13, 1896, amounted to \$371,000, for the corresponding week of last year the returns were \$340,000.

Accused Jack White, but No Case Was Made Out—Jack Had a Wad of His Own—A Boy Who Had Immoral Pictures.

Edward Haystead and Gilbert Guymer, of William street, were the only two in the magistrate's docket this morning. Guymer, who is a mere lad, confessed to being drunk.

The Police Magistrate—Had you anything on you like photographs when you were brought to the station?

Guymer—I don't think so.

Here several photographs of a highly immoral character were produced by Chief Williams, and these P.C. Woolway swore to having taken from Guymer's inside pocket when he searched him at the station.

The Police Magistrate—What do you say to that?

Guymer—I might have had them in my pocket, but they were not mine.

The Magistrate—You are lying about it now. Five dollars or ten days!

Haystead was discharged, this being his first offense.

John White, a city barber, was charged by Harry Norris, bar-tender at the Royal Hotel, with having stolen \$20 from him on the night of July 22 last.

Mr. Norris said the theft occurred while Mr. Evans, the proprietor, was away, and that he had taken the contents of the cash register and deposited it in a collar box in a trunk in his bedroom. White, it appears, was there that night. He was an intimate friend of Norris, and as he was so well acquainted with the us and outs of the place, suspicion fell on him. When Norris accused him of taking the money, White said that somebody had put \$35 in his hands while in the sitting-room.

Matthew Gould swore that he had met White about 8:30 that night. White had a roll of bills at that time, which was before they went to the Royal Hotel. The two, after having a stroll around, went to the depot, where they stayed for an hour or so, and then went to the Grigs House, where they signed the register, and were given room 44.

John McGuire, a bell-boy, was called, and said that he was summoned to White's room about 7:30, and that White had a roll of bills under his pillow, but paid him with some loose change out of his pants pocket.

Frank Love, who appeared for the accused, submitted that no case had been made out. Mr. McKillop admitted the evidence of Conductor Wrightman, a boarder at the hotel, was not of so strong a character as he was led to believe, and agreed with Mr. Love that the evidence given was not strong enough for a jury to handle, but was of opinion that the case was a very suspicious one, and believed there were good grounds for arrest.

White was therefore honorably acquitted.

The accused man has been in Chicago for the past year, and on his return to the city gave himself up on hearing that the authorities were after him.

John Vanstone and Wm. Werne were charged with disorderly conduct and throwing stones at a fence on Carling street. Vanstone was up a week ago on a similar charge, but was dismissed. The two men were both acquitted again.

Wm. Wyatt and Richard Adcock confessed frankly to having broken the bylaw governing the riding of bicycles. Wyatt rode on the sidewalk and Adcock used the path in Victoria Park. They were fined \$1 each.

LUCAN.

Lucan, July 12.—A very appropriate sermon was preached to the Orangemen of L. O. L. No. 682 by the Rev. R. H. Shaw, of Holy Trinity, Lucan.

From the 23rd chapter of Joshua and part of the 11th and 14th verses. The reverend gentleman bade them welcome to the house of God, and reminded them of the fact that from thousands of pulpits in this and other lands, the ministers of the Gospel were preaching the glad tidings to the members of this organization. The ideal of ancient Rome was power, the Greek sought his ideal in beauty, and the people of modern times beheld it in wealth, but he hoped the Orange Society would seek their ideal in the Book of Books, the Holy Bible. William Prince of Orange had passed that bourne from whence no traveler returned, but his deeds of valor and of wisdom still lived. He wound up an eloquent and appropriate sermon by dwelling upon the beauty of the Orange constitution, and said he felt sure it had no equal in any other institution in our land. At the conclusion of his remarks the choir and congregation simultaneously arose and sang lustily "God Save the Queen."

LOCAL BREVITIES.

—The waterworks office took in lots of cash today.

—Bishop Baldwin will confirm a class at Holy Trinity, Lucan, next Sunday.

The Pottersburg public schools, Gospel Hall, Lucan, and London South Mission will picnic at Springbank tomorrow.

—"Joe," one of the best horses at Hunter's livery, South London, was so badly kicked yesterday that he had to be killed this morning.

—Adelaide Street Baptist and South Side Presbyterian Sunday schools are picnicking today at Springbank in goodly numbers. They went down on the trolley.

—Mr. J. L. Goodburne, while proceeding to work this morning on his bicycle, collided with an obstruction in the roadway, and took a header, which resulted in a badly bruised leg and a few minor contusions.

—The audit committee of the Board of Education met yesterday afternoon and verified the passing of the disputed \$500 estimates for the enlargement of the Aberdeen kindergarten school.

—Mr. R. Kirkpatrick, of the city engineer's office, and an assistant, were engaged today in measuring the velocity of the river below the forks for the information of Mr. Goodnough, the sewerage expert.

—The total number of passengers carried into Goderich yesterday over the G. T. R., was 3,296. Of this number, 1,400, most of whom were picked up on the way.

—Mr. H. Goodnough, State sanitary inspector of Massachusetts, who is preparing a report on London's sewerage system, returned to Boston yesterday. He secured considerable data here, and is now in a position to complete his report.

The Presbytery of London meets in the Presbyterian Church, Port Stanley today, and will dispose of the resignation of Rev. J. A. Macdonald, of Knox Church, and the call to Rev. T. Wilson, of Luton, to King Street Church, this afternoon.

A bullet which had been accidentally fired into the leg of Stanley Macdonald, a boy living in London, was photographed by means of the X-rays at the Toronto General Hospital, and thus located and removed Sunday. The boy is recovering.

The young Armenian, Mesrob Bagdasarian, who is studying in Toronto for the ministry, is describing the atrocities in his native land to London audiences this week. He lectured to a small gathering in the Askin Street Methodist Church last night.

It is understood that Mr. T. H. Rothwell, president of the Dominion Cold Storage Company, has offered \$4,000 cash for lot No. 2, north side of Bathurst street, or to lease it for 21 years at \$15 a year. This will probably be the site of the new branch warehouse of the company.

—Burglars attempted to enter the residence of Mrs. B. Noble, of No. 363 Grey street, about midnight Sunday night, but were frightened away by the furious barking of a dog. The marauders also called next door, but courage again failed them, owing, probably, to the presence of two men within, who could be seen through a window. It was impossible to plainly distinguish the fellows, but one of them wore a light hat.

—St. Thomas Times: Mr. Brock, of London, insisted on Saturday at Port Stanley. Accordingly he set out from home on his bicycle, and all went well until he reached St. George street hill, which he intended crossing. He was, however, stopped, but nearing the bottom he struck a large stone, which precipitated himself and wheel into the ditch. Mr. Brock was assisted into Frank Goldin's residence, where it was found he had received a serious bruise of the hip. He returned to London on the train.

A telegram was today received by Mr. Dan. Donaldson, secretary of the united Scottish demonstration committee, to the effect that the pipe band of the famous Forty-eighth Highlanders of Toronto, who arrived on Monday next by the 8 p.m. C. P. R. express. The band will be met by members of the Balmoral Club in Highland costume and by officers and members of the various societies. It will play down to the city Hotel, where it will be quartered, and afterwards parade the principal streets. On the following day (Tuesday) it will be one of the chief attractions at the Scottish demonstration held at Port Stanley.

—St. Thomas Times: The Sailor Boy will likely take another route. They had some difficulty in Cleveland with the inspector, so the owner, rather than give in to the inspector, will send the boat from this line. She will likely run on some American line. A permit has been granted her to run on the lake here. This will be a serious drawback to Canada's popular summer resort; but, in all probability, the L. E. and D. R. R. managers will have another on this line. This line has been popular, and it is one of the best lines across the lake for a first-class passenger boat. Mr. G. E. Casey, M.P. for West Elgin, was in town the other day, and when asked by your correspondent as to the fixing of this harbor, he said that it was certainly going to be done. It was the principal harbor, therefore it would be fixed. We constantly rely on this, as Mr. Casey is a man of his word.

A LONDON WEST COMPLAINT.

Residents of London West are laying complaints by the wholesale about the public swimming in the river on Sundays and week days. Blackfriars dam is a favorite spot for the bathers, but it is unpleasantly conspicuous.

London Westers say that most of the swimming is done on the city side of the river, and that the police should prevent it. If the boys must swim, there are lots of places, at respectable distances from the public, further up the river.

The car was stopped and the unfortunate man brought over to Robinson's grocery store, at the corner of Wortley road and Bruce street, where Dr. Piper attended to his injuries. His head was badly bruised, but he will probably be able to get home about 6 o'clock.
