The subject of "Social Purity" afforded an admirable opportunity for the display of much earnestness and eloquence by Mrs. Holbrook Smith, of Washington, D. C., in her address to young men in Victoria Hall yesterday afternoon. A large audience had assembled to hear this gifted lady from the American national capital discuss one

the cardinal evil of the present age. She spoke with that force, fluency and assurance which is generally characteristic of strong conviction. DR. WILD AT THE FIRST CONGREGATIONAL

sermon was on "Three worlds without infants," and the text was taken from Isaiah, lxv., 20: "There shall be no more thence an infant of days, nor an old man that hath not filled his days; for the child shall die an hundred years old; but the sinner, being an hundred years old, shall be accursed." During the last 300 or 400 years of the millennium not a child would be born on earth, the doctor held, and this was to be one of the signs of the time. There was one world without infants. Then he contended at length that there would not be a child in hell. This constituted world No. 2 of a childless state. Then the

doctor held that there would be no infantile years in the millennium proper, neither gray hairs nor aching bones; because humanity would be resurrected in the prime of life at which prime the Saviour was crucified.
