A dozen men dragged Coleman from the grasp of his guards, and throwing a rope over his head, dragged him through the streets. wretch shrieked constantly for mercy, pleading for his life at every step. The mob carried Coleman to a small hollow near the railroad, where they bound him tightly to a young sap-Ang. Then they heaped a huge pile of brushwood and timber around him while he continued his cries for help.

CUT OUT HIS EYES, vitriol and cayenne pepper were thrown into the sockets, and his face

was smashed with a chunk of wood. His head rolled around and he was believed to be dead. A dozen torches were applied simultaneously, and huge tengues of flame swept up and around the senseless body. As the flames burst forth the immense crowd broke into cheers, which continued as long as the fire burned. Before the roasting began Coleman was almost dead. The rope had torn and lacerated his neck and his face was terribly beaten up.

COLEMAN'S CRIME. The crime for which Coleman was burned was the murder of Mrs. James Lashbrook, by whom he was eployed. She was enticed by him to enter a shed to see about some work, when he knocked her down and assaulted her. The blow, struck with an oak stave, was not effective, and Cole-man, amid her cries for mercy, went to the house, and, procuring a razor, cut her throat. At the Covington jail Coleman made a full confession, which left no doubt of his guilt.

RUFFIANISM IN CANADA. Bowmanville, Dec. 6. - The most diabolical act ever reported in part of Canada was enacted last Sun-day night at the farm residence of Frank Osborne, near the town line between Clarke and Darlington, two miles east of Bowmanville. While Mr. Osborne and wife were absent, attending services in Bowmanville, a young girl named Ida Knight being left in care of the children, four young men wearing masks entered the house. After frightening the girl upstairs, the men proceeded to destroy the furniture, carpets, pictures, etc. Three crocks of cream were spilled over the carpets, which were also cut with butcher knives, while valuable picbutcher knives, while valuable pictures were smashed on the floor. Filth Joubert. was made in the pariors, doors were smashed, clothing was destroyed, and other wanton acts committed. Worse than all this, however, was an attempt to poison the members of the family. Paris green was mixed in the flour and oatmeal, spread over the bottom of the pies and baked apples, and mixed in the tea, sugar, currants, etc. Subsequently entrance was made into the kitchen, and straw, old papers, etc., were gathered in a heap and set on fire, the object being evidently to burn up the occupants. Fortunately the servant girl smelled the smoke, and gave the alarm in time to save the building. Suspicion, based on almost positive evidence, rests on a certain young man as one of the culprits, and a warrant has been issued for his arrest. The whole neighborhood is in arms over the affair.


