**MUCH SMALLPOX**  
New York City—Mrs. Ferguson (Nee Mary Morrow, of Havelsk), Quarantined With Her Husband.

New York, May 21.—Fifty-six new cases of smallpox have been reported since the board of health since Saturday, and there have been five deaths due to the disease in the hospital on North Brother-island.

"We are not making any headway against smallpox and cannot until ev-eryone is vaccinated," said Dr. Dil-lingham, the assistant sanitary su-perintendent for Manhattan. "To that end, beginning with next Friday, and continuing until June 1, we will keep until 9 o'clock to give an opportunity to working persons who cannot come in daytime to be vaccinated."

Dr. Dillingham gave out a table, showing the number of smallpox cases, in the various states between Dec. 28, last and May 3. It shows that New York has had 601 cases, against 22 in the same period in 1900, but that other states have been scourged much more severely, notably Tennessee, with 4,228 cases; Ohio, with 1,685; Minnesota, with 2,753; Kansas, with 3,915; and Col-orado, with 1,782. Maine has had only one case and Connecticut only nine.

New Jersey has had 46.

**FELL UNDER THE WHEELS.**  
St. Thomas, May 22.—Herman Chute, 39 Hughes street, employed on the G. T. R. Wabash gravel train, fell off a car at Simcoe gravel pit, the wheels passing over his leg, causing a com-pound fracture below the knee. Dr. Hutchison, of this city, and Dr. King-ston, of Aylmer, set the fracture. It is not yet known whether the leg will have to be amputated or not.

**EACH ONE INSANE!**  
Worry Over a Young Woman Drove Her Two Elder Sisters Crazy.

New York, May 22.—The three White sisters—Catherine T., Mary Veronica and Agnes Cecilia—who were taken on Saturday from their home at 154 East 127th street, to Belle-vue Hospital, were all declared insane yesterday by Drs. Fitch and Wild-man, the lunacy experts. There was no doubt in the mind of the examin-ing physicians that the elder sisters, Catherine and Mary, had become insane soon after the death of their wife eight years ago.

**WITH CRONJE AT ST. HELENA!**  
British Surgeon Says Cronje Told Him the Boers Would Never Give Up.

An Imperial Star for Canadians Who Served in South Africa—Pro-Boer Resolution Defeated.

New Orleans, May 22.—Dr. E. Mc-Carthy, surgeon on one of the British transports between this city and Cape Colony, who has just arrived here from Cape Town, reports that the vessel up-on which he returned stopped at St. Helen and while there he had a chance to talk freely and privately with Gen. Cronje and the other Boer prisoners there, who exceed 4,000 in number. He also talked with Col. Schieles, the Aus-trian who was captured with Cronje at the battle of Paardeburg.

Gen. Cronje said that he had been kindly treated in his captivity, but that a very strong guard was kept over him to prevent any attempt at escape. He was totally ignorant of the progress of the war, and did not even know that President Kruger had left the Transvaal, but expressed the opin-ion that the Boers would never cease fighting until they won their cause, as they preferred death to English rule.

**IMPERIAL STAR FOR CANADIANS.**  
Toronto, May 21.—The Canadian Military Gazette, issued today, says: It will be learned with pleasure by all those who served for the empire's glory in South Africa that in all proba-bility they will receive an Imperial medal in addition to the regular British medal. The idea originated in Cape

Colony, and has been taken up with zest in all of the fourteen separate countries which were represented in the fighting lines. All the colonies will contribute towards the cost.

**RESOLUTION DEFEATED.**  
Brussels, May 21.—The Senate to-day, by 37 to 22 votes, rejected a resolu-tion introduced by M. La Fontaine (Socialist), declaring in favor of the Transvaal, and regretting that Bel-gium was powerless to do anything in the matter. The foreign minister, M. De Faverue, replying to the ac-tual debate, made during the debate that British soldiers had massacred Boer women and children, and had otherwise ill-treated the Boers, said that Great Britain had carried civilization to all the countries of the world, and had everywhere defended liberty of the person and of conscience.

**"BOBS" IN POOR HEALTH.**  
London, May 22.—The Morning Lead-ers say that the health of Earl Ro-berts, commander-in-chief of the British army, is giving his friends con-cern. The work in his department of the war office is greatly in arrears.

**DEWEY'S WHEREABOUTS.**  
Pretoria, May 22.—Army officers claim to have information that Gen. Dewey is not in Cape Colony. They say that, with 4,000 armed Boers and three field guns, he is in the difficult country near Botha's pass. This place is located between Orange Colony and Natal, and not far from Majuba Hill. In this country the Boers have scored their greatest success.

Dewey is said to have plenty of food and forage.

**200 CHINESE KILLED.**  
Berlin, May 21.—A dispatch from Field Marshal Von Waldersee, dated May 19, says 200 Chinese were killed or wounded as a result of the explosion of the Kalgan arsenal, May 15, when Lieut. Kummer, of the Ger-man army, and several german sol-diers were wounded.

The Boxer movement south of Pao Ting Fu is apparently being speedily quelled by Gen. Bailoud, the French commander. The Boxers, Gen. Bailoud reports, are being dealt with suc-cessfully by Chinese troops.

**AGED 19 AND ACCUSED OF BIG-AMY.**  
New York, May 22.—A Jersey City detective came to Brooklyn yesterday and arrested Mrs. Gladys Downer Braumlich, 19 years old, on a charge of bigamy. She had her alleged first husband, Peter Braumlich, had been living in a furnished room under the name of Brooks. She was locked up and held pending a requisition from New York. It is alleged that she was married to Walter F. Burns May 19, married Braumlich at Good Ground, L. I., in 1898. Mrs. Braumlich has been a variety actress, and was once billed to appear on the stage as Alice Gladys Castleman.

**DEPORTING GYPSIES.**  
New York, May 22.—Fifty Serbian Gypsies who were detained on Ellis Island, as likely to become public charges, have been taken to the steamship Lahn for deportation. In spite of the fact that the gypsies had about \$5,000 and were bound for Canada, the immigration officials decided that they could not land. One of the objections to admitting the gypsies is their filthy-ness. The silver spangles on their clothing cannot hide the grime, and their habits are disgusting.

Bigamy is becoming somewhat com-mon in Toronto. The police were three cases before the police magistrate this (Tuesday) morning.

**MACHINERY TO COME IN FREE.**  
Government Framing Bill to En-courage Beet Sugar Manu-facture.

**Plains of Abraham Will Be Purchased**—Estimates for Harbors—Bounty on Lead Refining.

Ottawa, May 21.—The bill respecting the Ottawa branch of the royal mint was put through its final stages in the house today.

The report of the committee upon the resolution increasing the sessional indemnity for members of parliament, introduced upon it was introduced and given a first reading.

**HARBORS ESTIMATES.**  
All the items for harbors and rivers in Ontario, amounting to \$400,000, having been passed after prolonged discussion, the remainder of the public works sup-plementary estimates for harbors and rivers for the Provinces of Manitoba and British Columbia, also for dredg-ing, slides and booms, roads and bridges, telegraph lines and miscel-laneous, and the public works supple-mentary estimates chargeable to cap-ital, were voted with great rapidity.

All the public works items having been disposed of, the supplementary estimates of the minister of trade and commerce were taken up.

**BEET SUGAR MACHINERY.**  
Shortly before midnight Mr. Field-ing introduced a resolution providing for the removal of the duty on beet root sugar making machinery. It puts on the free list all machinery used in the manufacture of beet root sugar, and structural iron and steel for use in the construction of such factories. The resolution was adopted at mid-night, and Mr. Fielding introduced a bill in accordance with it.

The house went into supply, taking up the item for the purchase of the Plains of Abraham.

After some discussion the item passed.

**LOW SPIRITS CAUSED HIM TO SUICIDE**  
Terrible Deed of a Former Londoner in Milwaukee.

**Wrote a Note to His Wife and Deliberately Drowned Himself.**  
"I Hope No Man Ever Lived Who Has to Go Through the Tortures of My Feelings," Wrote James H. Carrothers.

Milwaukee, May 22.—The body of Jas. H. Carrothers, formerly a proprietor of the Kirby House, and one time a resident of London, Ont., was recovered from the Milwaukee River at noon, on Friday.

Mr. Carrothers, who was found floating in the river, had committed suicide and had premeditated the act at least since the previous Wednesday.

A letter addressed to Mrs. J. H. Car-rothers, 617 State street, was found in the pocket of his coat on shore. The letter, which was written in German, said: "My dear Alice and Mildred, after due consideration I have decided upon the previous Wednesday."

It ended in an incoherent and almost illegible manner, but enough was said to indicate that the man was desper-ately over money matters.

A heavy diamond ring, a Masonic badge and some clothing were found on the river bank near Kern's farm this morning, about a mile and a half north of the city limit. It pointed to suicide.

Following is the text of a portion of the letter addressed to his wife: "My dear Alice and Mildred: After due consideration I have decided upon this course. If I had the strength to fight this thing without counsel, which you know I have not, I would not do what I am about to do, and I hope no man ever lived has got to go through the tortures of my feelings at this moment, and every man I ever met the reason I could not pay. If I made errors in the assignment case, that I know about or anything else in regard to same assigned to lack of thought in giving. If I was not a citi-zen of the United States I know I had told him three or four times that I was I may have made an error. I am very nervous, my dear."

"In regard to the Palmyra case, bosh! two imbeciles with a load of alcoholic spirits then went to the plankton with in regard to the plankton with cash-hound me so much with ask me what the badge I wore meant. I told him three or four times that I was a social order, Masons. Finally he tor-tured me so much by the same. He thought I was an Orangeman. What did I know about an O, same as you, my dear."

The remainder of the letter referred to life insurance, on which premiums had been paid by "the consistory," and to matters in language that could not be deciphered.

Mr. Carrothers was 45 years of age, and was employed as a traveling sales-man. He was proprietor of the Kirby House with Eugene Josselyn, of Osh-kosh, for a number of years up to five years ago.

Mr. Carrothers had been employed in the crockery department at Gim-bel Bros.' store since Christmas. Gim-bel Bros. store shortly after noon of her husband's suicide, and at once went to her home.

Mr. Carrothers at one time kept the Hutchinson House in Stoughton, and at another period was proprietor of a Janesville house.
