Sensational Disclosures Made by an Austrian Journalist-The Times

Vienna, June 22.—The Vienna Zeit publishes a report of the Kichineff massacre made by its special correspondent sent to investigate the cause of the outbreak, and who endeavored to secure his information from non-Jewish quarters. The correspondent went first to St. Petersburg, where he learned from positive and authentic information that the outbreak had been long prepared, and that M. Interior, not only had full knowledge of the preparations, but was in realty the stage manager of the drama. As the individual actors outplayed their parts, M.
