THE PRINCESS BEATRICE WAS WILDLY JEALOUS

Reasons for Her Attempt at Suicide.

Death of Bret Harte, the Noted American Author.

Condition of Queen Wilhelmina Still Critical—Royal Family of Greece in Peril.

PRINCESS WAS JEALOUS.

Rome, May 6.—It is learned that Princess Beatrice, daughter of Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender, who attempted to commit suicide, arrived at the Sistine bridge, beautifully dressed and wearing jewels. She made the sign of the cross and then jumped into the Tiber. Her clothing kept her afloat until two policemen jumped into the river and rescued her.

She refused to give her name to the police, who decided to take her to a hospital. Upon arriving in the hospital ward she revealed her identity, and explained that her attempt at self-destruction was due to jealousy of her husband, Prince Massimo. The princess is now suffering from fever, and her father has been summoned.

Princess Elvira, a sister of Princess Beatrice, ran away with a painter, named Folchi, two years ago.

DEATH OF BRET HARTE.

London, May 6.—Died here last night, the American author, died here last night. He was born at Albany, N. Y., on Aug. 25, 1839. Bret Harte died suddenly at the Red House, Camberley, near Aldershot, from hemorrhage, caused by an affection of the throat.

Mr. Harte had been living quietly in England for years. Most of his time was spent in the country, and when in London he was almost equally secluded, having few visitors to his rooms at Lancaster Gate, and only going to the houses of a limited number of very intimate friends. Several months ago, when a Wales report of his death was circulated in America, a representative of the Associated Press called at his rooms. Mr. Harte then appeared to be perfectly well. He laughed heartily and quoted Mark Twain's old saying about the report being grossly exaggerated. "Except for a little cold," said Mr. Harte, "I have no ailments or complaints. While I am getting to be a pretty old man" (pointing to his snow-white hair), "there is life in the old dog yet," and thereupon he lit a cigar so large that it would have done credit to any of his Poker Flat friends. He was hoping, he also said, to do some more work, but he confessed he was growing lazier.

BRET HARTE'S DEATH WAS SUDDEN.

London, May 6.—Mr. Harte had been suffering from swollen tonsils since December last, but he did not consider it was anything to be serious. A week ago he went to visit some friends at Cam-

berley, and was present at lunch as usual yesterday. But he suddenly became ill in the afternoon, went to bed and died in a few hours. His end was peaceful.

QUEEN WILHELMINA.

The Hague, May 6.—Queen Wilhelmina's physicians, in their morning bulletin, issued at Castle Loo, says: "After a slight rise in her temperature yesterday evening, the queen had a quiet night and slept most of the time. Her temperature this morning is normal, and her condition at the present moment is fairly satisfactory, although the patient still requires great care and attention."

Queen Wilhelmina went through a similar illness about a year ago, when there was great disappointment among the people who had looked forward to greeting an heir to the throne. A few weeks ago the young queen was taken ill with typhoid, and for a time her death was feared. Then the fever subsided, and on Saturday she was reported to have practically recovered. The event of Saturday night had been feared from the first of the typhoid attack.

Telegrams continue to pour in from royal and other notable personages, begging the queen to accept the condition of Queen Wilhelmina, and expressing the most sincere sympathy with her majesty.

ROYAL FAMILY IN PERIL.

Athens, May 6.—While the royal yacht Amphitrite, with the royal family of Greece on board was on its way to Chalkis last night, it stranded in the Euripus Channel. Vessels have gone to the scene to assist in refloating the Amphitrite.

The royal party were proceeding to Chalkis to celebrate the king's name day. Chalkis is on the west coast of Euboea Island, 35 miles from Athens.

THE CATTLE EMBARGO.

In answering a question to the House of Commons, suggesting the desirability of augmenting the food supply in view of the present prospective short supply of beef, the president of the board of agriculture, R. W. Hanbury, said that the government could not remove the restrictions placed on the importation of Canadian store cattle; but, possibly, Argentine beasts might be admitted on the same conditions as cattle from the United States. Mr. Hanbury added that he was awaiting information on the subject from the Argentine government.

COMBINE WON'T HURT CANADA.

Lord Strathcona, interviewed by the Daily Mail, said that in his opinion the proposed steamship combine would not materially hurt Canada. It would help to insure the establishment of the Canadian fast line of steamships, a line that would embrace vessels superior even to the ocean greyhounds which Germany is now building.

He said he hoped for great results from the forthcoming conference of colonial premiers, and believed that the issues which would be discussed would be of great importance to the realization of the colonial dream of federation.

ANOTHER CONSUMPTION CURE.

Another attempt to combat tuberculosis has just been communicated to the President of the Academy of Medicine by Dr. Spadali. He claims to have arrested the progress of incipient consumption by administering iodide of potassium in solution in very small doses, followed by an inhalation of essence of turpentine lasting ten minutes. This treatment is concurrent with the usual hygienic and dietetic treatment.

CABLE NOTES.

The pope was greatly distressed when informed of the death of Archbishop O'Connell of New York. His holiness had been a constant inquirer for news throughout the archbishop's illness.

It is currently reported that the Dowry of the Marquis de Sade has decided to enter a convent.

ROSS GEDDES, FOLLOWED BY MORE CHERS.

The route lay through streets decorated with many flags and banners. Among the mottoes on the streamers were: "West Lambton Welcomes the Premier," "Vote for Pardee, Progress and Prosperity," "Remember Ross," and "Sarnia Sawmills Show the Sawlog Policy of the Liberals." This afternoon the premier attended a reception, between 4 and 5 o'clock, under the auspices of the R. Y. S. Brigade, of which he is president, when for upwards of an hour a steady stream of visitors shook the hand of the distinguished visitor.

A PROCESSION.

Prior to the opening of the meeting tonight a procession was organized, which paraded through the streets. Lieut. Col. Ellis was chief marshal, and Capt. Collis, assistant marshal. The Sarnia brass band led, while the other bodies marching were the Sarnia Liberal Association, the various ward organizations of the Reform Association, and the 29th Regiment Bugle Band.

The processionists, together with those already gathered, filled Victoria Hall to overflowing, and many were turned away.

AT THE AUDITORIUM.

The large auditorium was filled in every available inch of space, with not less than 2,000 persons. The mottoes and streamers included these: "Liberals Love Their Elloquent Leader," "Lambton is Satisfied, She Needs No Chieftain," "The Liberals Brought the Tall Chimneys," Dr. A. J. Fisher, of Bridgen, president of the West Lambton Reform Association, was chairman. Among those with him on the platform were: Hon. George W. Ross, M.P.; W. H. Taylor, ex-M.P.P.; Liberal candidate in North Middlesex; Rev. Dr. Thompson, Sarnia; J. H. Fraser, M.P.; Dr. Coler; George Sanson, Petrolia; Mayor Logie, Sarnia; Montague Smith, Forest; United States Consul McMillan, Sarnia.
