

LORD ROBERTS REVIEWS 7TH SAYS BRIGADE SPLENDID ONE

Hero of Kandahar Compliments Brigadier Little on Fine Showing of Command—"Bobs" May Pay Brief Visit to London—Col. Young Hurt in Fall From Horse.

[From Our Own Man.]

Quebec, July 21.—The Seventh Regiment, of London, was this morning reviewed by Lord Roberts. With the famous general was Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, Gen. Otter, commander-in-chief of militia forces, and a distinguished entourage of officers.

The First Brigade, under Brigadier Little, of London, lined up on an immense field, which lies to the north of the camp grounds.

All morning the Seventh (London), Thirtieth (Hamilton), Twenty-first (Essex) and Ninety-first (Hamilton Highlanders) paraded and drilled, for it had been tipped off to the officers that "Bobs" was coming.

A Magnificent Spectacle.

All other divisions, four in all, also paraded on different grounds, though separated only by rail fences. The spectacle was the most magnificent ever witnessed in Canada, and the men massed on the field, made the greatest army of Canadian soldiers ever assembled. Away to the north, the Laurentian Mountains formed a fitting background for a host of brilliantly-uniformed infantrymen, cavalrymen, artillerymen, red coats, khaki trousers and kilts. Thousands of horses were in the review, thousands of bayonets glistened in the July sun; scores of pieces of artillery rattled hither and thither.

"Bobs" Arrives.

Far away to the left, a cry went up of "Bobs," and instantly the entire cavalry brigade sent up a cheer that shook the hills. Lord Roberts remained only a minute or so, and then galloped to the lines of the First Brigade. Brigadier Little had the men drawn up with magnificent precision. The Seventh first to the right, then the Thirtieth, the Twenty-first Essex, and finally Ninety-first Highlanders. The hero of Kandahar rode with Brigadier Little at his right along the lines of men minutely inspecting the ranks. At the conclusion of the ride he said: "There is a good division. Where does it come from?"

"Western Ontario," replied Brigadier Little, with a touch of pride. "What regiments compose it?" Brigadier Little told him.

"It is a good one," Lord Roberts said. "It is credit to you." The brigadier then called for three cheers for Lord Roberts, and they were given with a vim.

"Bobs" May Come Here.

It is unofficially stated that "Bobs" has consented to visit London for two hours on Saturday of Old Boy week unless an unforeseen contingency arises. It is understood that he told Col. Denison he would like to visit London if possible, but the visit must be brief. Sir John Carling has been in communication with the Governor-General and Gen. Otter in an effort to get "Bobs" to go to London.

A Fine Horseman.

Lord Roberts is quite stout now, and looks remarkably well. He rides his horse with head on chest, Napoleonic-like, and sits like a statue. With him is the Duke of Norfolk, world-famed as the most influential Roman Catholic in the British Empire. Norfolk spends much time at Chateau Frontenac, but "Bobs" sticks pretty well to the citadel, where his quarters are.

Mayor Stevelly Here.

Mayor Stevelly and ex-Mayor Judd, of London, visited the British warship Exmouth yesterday, and were shown over the battleship.

The guns of the fort are constantly booming, as officers visit each other.

Col. Young Hurt.

Col. Young, formerly of London, was slightly hurt by a fall from his horse in the camp grounds today.

Brigadier Little this morning placed Bandmaster Ruthven, of the Twenty-first Essex Fusiliers, under arrest. He had ordered the band to cease playing, but the musicians kept right on, despite the order.

In a few minutes, though, Col. Little allowed the bandmaster to go, strongly reprimanding him. The health of the Seventh Regiment remains good. The weather is warm and the men are comfortable at night. The food is excellent, and the grounds dry. The water, however, is warm and unpalatable. Orders appear to have changed re the prince's arrival. The Seventh, Thirtieth and Forty-eighth will send pickets for guards, but on different days. The Seventh will line the streets tomorrow and Friday.

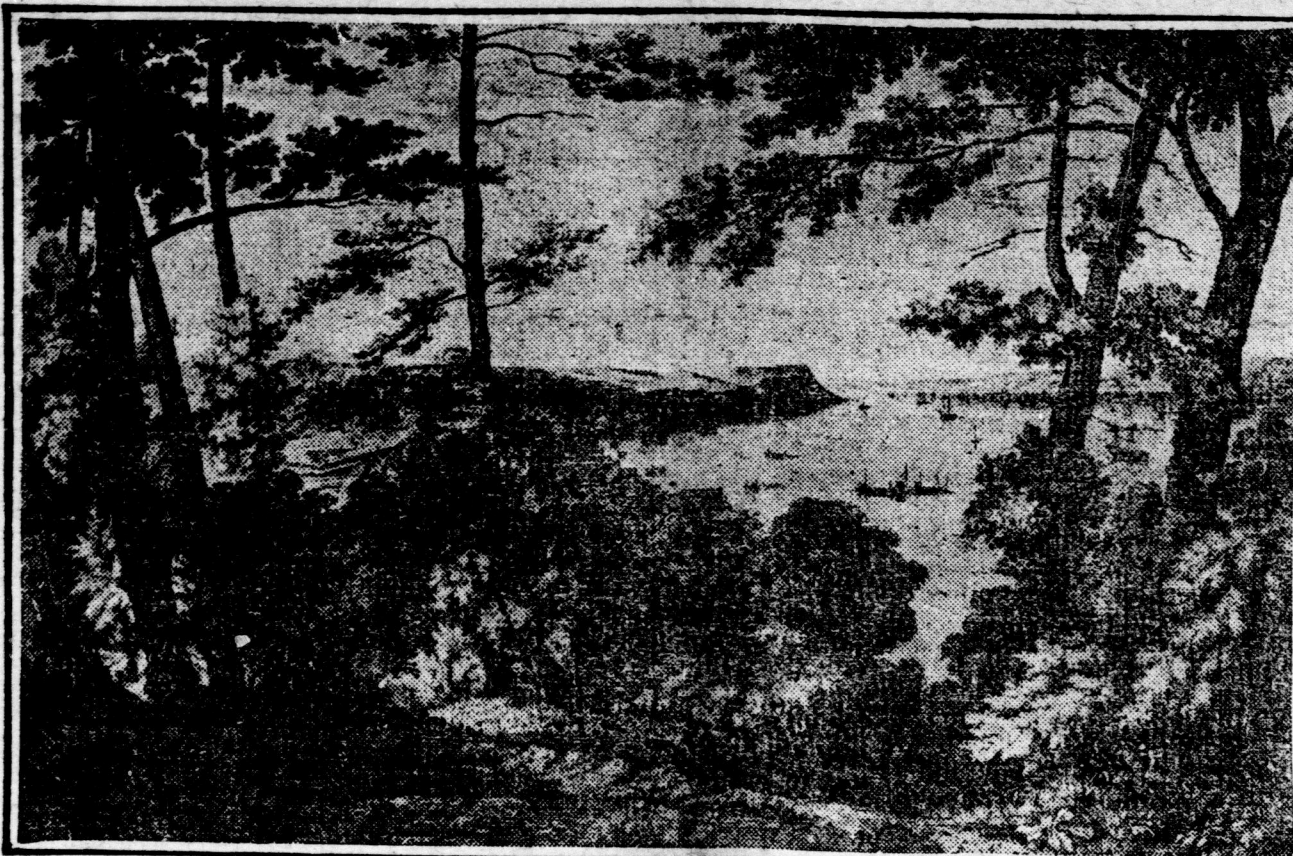
Beware of the Clothesline Thieves

KERR, CANADIAN WON HIS HEAT

Beating the American Crack Runner in 200-Metre Flat Race.

London, July 21.—There are only two finals on today's programme of the field and track events in the Olympic games at the stadium, the running high jump and the 800 metres flat race. While both of these events will create some interest, there are some heats to be run off, the results of which are more eagerly awaited, notably the semi-finals in the 100 metres dash and the 400 metres hurdles.

The morning, which is somewhat clearer than previous days, saw the commencement of the running jump, and the heats of the first round of the 200 metres flat race. As there are fifteen heats in the latter event, there was little time for anything else, but the committee managed to get in the third heat of the high diving contest.

200-Metre Race. Kerr, of Canada, who was more feared by the United States sprinters than any other foreign competitor, carried off his heat in the 200 metres flat race today, defeating W. W. May, University of Illinois, one of the best men on the American team. It was a good race, May pushing Kerr right up to the tape.

George, United Kingdom, won the first heat of the 200 metres dash in the Olympic games today, beating Henney, Holland, the only other competitor. Time, 23.2-5 seconds.

Harks Back 300 Years Pageant in Full Swing

Ancient Capital Is Picturesque With Old-Time Ways and Costumes.

Quebec, July 20.—The Champlain Tercentenary celebration every day assumes greater proportions. The incidental spectacle on the streets of Quebec today is one that in picturesqueness could not be duplicated anywhere. Thousands of people dressed in modern summer garb, hundreds of clerics of various orders, men in uniform representing every section of the Canadian militia, Jack Tars of the three great navies participants in what are to be the great spectacular features of the celebration, all lend to the most beautiful of the North American cities the attractiveness of a vivid life which moderns associate with the Middle Ages.

The great event of the day was the arrival of the Mounted Heralds-at-Arms and Men of the Watch, one of the conceptions of Mr. Frank Lascelles, who is in charge of the general picture. Mr. Lascelles is the man who put on the Oxford pageant last year and who goes to the City of London for the historic commemoration of that city next year. Considering the limited means at his disposal, this spectacle here is a remarkable one. In using the word limited, one does not mean that the matter of funds is involved, but the assistance and properities necessary are very difficult to secure; for instance, this afternoon Mr. Lascelles had to appeal to the military authorities for one hundred and fifty horses, which he could not obtain elsewhere, and which are promised him.

The stupendous character of the spectacle may be realized when it is explained that to move one great sheet of canvas painted blue, and representing the floor of the court of Francis the First, fifty Jack Tars were required. (Continued on Page Nine.)

CATTLE EMBARGO WILL CONTINUE

A Straight Statement That the British Government Will Not Remove It.

London, July 20.—Sir Edward Strachey, member of Parliament for the South Division of Somerset and representative of the board of agriculture in the House of Commons, dashed the hopes of those who had advocated the importation of Canadian cattle by Commons this afternoon, when the Government had no present intention of proposing legislation removing the prohibition of such importation. The Irish party in the Commons are to a man opposed to any removal of the embargo, and all stand together in vigorous opposition to any attempt to raise it. They say it would involve Ireland in bankruptcy.

Gang Operating at Sandwich—Three Places Entered.

Walkerville, Ont., July 21.—The provincial police are looking for a gang of burglars, who have been operating in this vicinity recently. The police have received reports that three places in Sandwich East, above here, were entered in one night, the burglars getting about \$30 in stamps from Charles Montreuil's hotel, the offices of the McGregor-Banwell Fence Company, and the office of the Crounman Coal Company.

PHONE COMPETITION

Another Company Seeks Entrance to Chatham.

Chatham, Ont., July 21.—Still another independent telephone company is seeking an entrance into this city. Neil Watson's Ridgeway and Mull companies is said to be ready to compete with the Blenheim and South Harwich companies. Both are fighting the Bell company in the rural districts.

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MASKED ROBBERS WERE OUTWITTED

Plucky Cashier Foiled the Six Crooks, Who Finally Ran Away.

Ada, O., July 21.—Six masked men rode into this place late last night and attempted to rob the local bank. With three of the gang waited near the bank building, the other three went to the home of Cashier Myers, and arousing him, compelled him to go to the bank with them.

They attempted to compel Myers to open the safe. The cashier, however, was equipped with a time lock, and so it could not be opened. Thereupon two of the members took Myers to a nearby woods and tied him up, the other four men remaining at the bank to blow the safe.

Myers, however, managed to escape from his captors, and promptly turned in a fire alarm, arousing the citizens. The crooks jumped on their horses and galloped out of town. They were pursued for some distance, but finally escaped in the darkness.

Bloodhounds will be placed on their trail. The robbers did not succeed in opening the safe.

NOT THE NOTORIOUS RUSSIAN ADMIRAL

It Was Another Rojstevsky Who Died in Germany.

Berlin, July 21.—The announcement made yesterday from Bad Nauheim, Germany, that Vice-Admiral Rojstevsky, who commanded the ill-fated Russian fleet that was annihilated by the Japanese in the battle of the Sea of Japan in May, 1905, had died there the night of July 19 from heart trouble, is incorrect.

A Russian named Rojstevsky did die at Bad Nauheim, but he was not the admiral.

Ante-Mortem Comment. The papers of St. Petersburg commented uncharitably on the reported death of Vice-Admiral Rojstevsky. The Reich says that although acquitted by the courtmartial he was condemned by public opinion as one of the guilty naval officers who personally contributed to the Russian naval disaster in the Sea of Japan years before it occurred. At the notorious manoeuvres off Revel in the presence of the German Emperor, Rojstevsky's fleet, this paper declares, attained brilliant firing averages by means of fraudulent targets, and later as chief of the naval staff he superintended the building of worthless battleships of the Borodomo type, which were an easy prey to the enemy—the Japanese fire sank the Borodomo in twenty minutes.

Thunder Clap Assists a Murderer Crash Deadens Sound of Shots

A Widow the Victim—Bullets Miss Daughter—Slayer Steals \$2,300.

Hackensack, N. J., July 21.—Mrs. Ottillie Eberhard, widow of a well-to-do Viennese merchant, who arrived in this country with her daughter on Thursday to live in New York, was murdered and robbed of \$2,300 in a lonesome spot on the tracks of the New York, Susquehanna and Western Railroad, near Rochelle Park, two

miles west of Hackensack, late Saturday night.

Daughter Narrowly Escapes.

Ottillie Eberhard, the 20-year-old daughter, who was with her mother, narrowly escaped death also, four shots having been fired at her, one passing through the rim of her straw hat, another so close to her head that it scorched her right eye, another grazing and breaking the skin on her left shoulder and the fourth bullet having flattened itself on one of her corset stays in the middle of her back. The police are looking for Augustus Eberhard, nephew of the dead woman. (Continued on Page Two.)

Ignored a Summons to Court And Spends Night in a Cell

A Citizen Smartly Punished for Contempt of Court.

The next time that Mr. Henry Hornby gets a summons to appear in the police court as a witness, he will probably not treat it with the same contempt that he did the last one. Mr. Hornby was summoned to appear in court last Saturday morning as a witness in the case of abusive language

laid by Conductor Hanna, of the London street railway, against George Lewis. Mr. Hornby evidently did not think it was worth while, and did not put in an appearance. He was arrested last evening and spent the night in the cells. When he appeared before Magistrate Love this morning he was in a very penitent mood and apologized profusely to the court for not obeying the summons. Hornby promised never to be guilty of such an offence again and Magistrate Love very kindly allowed him to go instead of giving him the penalty allowed by the law.

Fire Engine Boiler Stands Test Steams Quickly and Good Stream

Official Trial Made Before Chief and City Representatives Yesterday.

The official test of the new boiler in the fire engine was conducted yesterday afternoon by Chief Clark and his men in the presence of Ald. Greenlees, chairman of No. 3 committee, Ald. Booth and Mr. Hugh Cameron, representative of the Watrous Engine Company, the firm that supplied the new boiler. The test was very successful in every particular, and the city representatives were highly pleased with it.

Shortly after 3 o'clock the engine was taken to the flats at Hunt's Mills. A fire was started and in ten minutes there were 60 pounds of steam showing. In thirteen minutes there were 100 pounds of steam.

Two streams were thrown by the steamer over 100 feet.

"The test was completely satisfactory," said Chief Clark. "The new boiler did the work in a most satisfactory manner, and is according to contract."

"The engine seems all right," said Ald. Greenlees. "It was in every way satisfactory. I think the engine should last a long time. So far as I can judge the work was well done."

"The fireman got steam up, but Mr. Cameron had said he could. I think the test was quite satisfactory."

A pressure of 160 pounds was the limit of the test, and at this pressure the engine worked very smoothly. The old engine sent by the Watrous Company to replace it temporarily will be returned to Brantford today. It is a relic of other days, and as a curiosity is worth considerable.

The new engine will be placed in commission today.

Many King Street Residents Want the Pavement Resurfaced

Will Petition Council Asking It To Look Into the Matter.

The residents of King street are getting up a petition asking the council to apply the 10 per cent guarantee left with the city treasurer by Blight & Fielder, contractors for the King street pavement, to repair the pavement.

It is at present in a very bad condition, but it is doubtful whether the sum left with the city treasurer, which amounts to about \$800, will do the work at all satisfactorily.

The upper surface is practically gone, and in some places the foundation is beginning to wear.

To make any sort of a job at all, the whole street would have to be resurfaced, and then the pavement would last some time.

Bligh & Fielder guaranteed the pavement for five years, which has very nearly run. "The contractors would have to be notified to repair the pavement," said Acting City Engineer Kirkpatrick, "and if they did not do the work within 48 hours, the city could use the guarantee to repair the pavement."

"It is at present in a very bad condition," he continued. "It is hard to see what can be done. The debentures have ten years to run, and the council cannot issue a second series of debentures on the same pavement without special legislation. So a contract for a new pavement could not be let without that legislation, and that, of course, would take some time. It might not be granted at all."

"The street is a frightful one," said a prominent resident to The Advertiser. "The surface is completely gone, and what is left is not even a good mud-puddle. The dust from it is very bad, and is causing a great deal of inconvenience. I think the council should do something to get it repaired. We must continue to pay for ten years for a pavement that is worse than the original road. It is disgraceful."

"Many of us were willing to pay for a good pavement, but a number of them wanted the cheaper class," said another resident. "They got what they wanted, and I hope it is cheap enough. It is to make a decent job of it. However, something will have to be done. I would favor resurfacing it with asphalt. But the difficulty comes regarding the debentures. I wish the council would take the matter up and help us out of the difficulty. It is rather a serious one, I assure you."

It is expected that the petition will be sent to the council shortly, and then the matter will be taken up officially.

A SEPARATED COUPLE IN CONTEST FOR CHILD

A Windsor Man Causes the Arrest of Girl's Mother.

Windsor, July 21.—To regain possession of his 7-year-old daughter Marie, Thomas Cornell, a laborer has caused the arrest of his wife, Mary Cornell.

Cornell and his wife separated some time ago, the wife going to Detroit with her child to work. Three weeks ago the husband crossed the river and brought the little girl home to live with his mother.

A short time later Mrs. Cornell came over and took the child back. Cornell has laid the charge in police court in an attempt to show that his wife is not a fit guardian for the child. The woman was taken into custody at the dock as she came from Detroit and is now locked up awaiting a hearing.

EXTENDING GROUNDS OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Two Lots Ninety Feet Deep Secured Back of St. George's School.

The board of education is making considerable headway with the purchase of land for the enlargement of several school grounds in the city.

Already Trustees E. J. MacRobert, chairman of the board of schools, has secured two lots 90 feet deep, at the rear of St. George's school, and the grounds will be made ready immediately for use of the youngsters after the summer vacation.

It is the intention of the board to enlarge several other school grounds, and options have been obtained on some of the property, although the negotiations have not progressed sufficiently to take in all the property needed.

It is the intention of the board to have the finest lot of playgrounds in Canada when the work is done. The work of painting the schools is being done by a large staff of men.
