\$11.50 Per Ton Was the Ruling Figure on London Market
—Little Grain Offered.

Prices remained practically unchanged on the local market this morning. As Monday is a holiday, and there will be no market for hay until next Tuesday, bidding was very keen and quotations remained firm.

Hay was worth \$10 to \$12 a ton, \$11.50 being the ruling figure. Oats are sold at \$1.27 to \$1.32 per cwt. No other grain was offered.

McEwan was kicked in the throat and before he could be brought to this city, the air which he breathed in through the hole in his throat instead of entering his lungs, got under the skin, bloating him up to an abnormal extent. While he is naturally but an ordinary sized person, he had the appearance of a man of about three hundred pounds.

Notwithstanding that things are unusually quiet around the Grand Trunk today the company had men out all last night patrolling every mile of the track in the district. The men's orders were to walk over the ground regularly and each man had a mile of track to look after.

The guard was changed today, and has been maintained, and it is expected that another special guard will go on again tonight.

No Violence.
"There has been no violence reported today," said Superintendent Gillen to The Advertiser this afternoon. "Things are going along very quietly. There is very little freight moving, but we are taking all that is offered."

At the strikers' headquarters at Culham Hall today it was stated that everything is going along quietly.

"Our position is improving every day," said one of the strikers. "Not a man from this city has gone back and will not. Many of our men have had flattering offers to return to work, but none will go. The company are losing immense sums of money every day. Many of the cars that go through here are going through empty. There is no money in moving empty cars. In addition, every train has several extra men on it, and many officials are out running trains. Trainmaster Forrester, of Stratford, is out on a freight train today. The company has got to come to terms sooner or later, but they will not do that, we can wait just as long as they can."

COLORED PREACHER SETTLED TO JAIL

Woodstock Man Guilty of Offence Against a Young Girl.
