WHAT THE ACT SAYS REGARDING SUNDAY CARS

Position of the London and Lake Erie Railway Under the Law.

Sunday cars on the London and Lake Erie Railway are creating much discussion, and the Lord's Day Alliance is still considering making a fight in opposition to them.

The clauses of the Lord's Day Act of 1906, referring to the operation of Sunday cars, are as follows:

The Act.
 Clause 2 of chapter 153 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, an act respecting the Lord's Day, is as follows:

"Nothing herein shall prevent the operation on the Lord's Day, for passenger traffic, by any railway company incorporated by or subject to the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada of its railway, where such operation is not otherwise prohibited. Nothing herein shall prevent the operation on the Lord's Day for passenger traffic of any railway, subject to the legislative authority of any province, unless such railway is prohibited by provincial authority from so operating."

Clause 8 of the same act is as follows:

"It shall not be lawful for any person on the Lord's Day, except as provided by any provincial act or law now or hereafter in force, to run, conduct, or convey by any mode of conveyance, any excursions on which passengers are conveyed for hire, and having for its principle or only object the carriage for amusement or pleasure, and the passengers so conveyed shall not be deemed to be travellers within the meaning of this act."

The London and Lake Erie Railway is now altogether under Dominion jurisdiction, the recent charter granted the company hearing the seal of the Dominion House of Commons and the Senate of Canada. The road is not a street railway, and cannot be controlled by the provincial laws relating to street railways. The sections of act applied by a local paper some days ago relate altogether to street railways, and in no sense apply to a railway chartered by the Dominion.

Clause 8, of course, prevents the running of excursions. It does not refer to regular traffic.

A new style of locomotive, designed to burn soft coal without smoke, is receiving a trial on two or three railroads entering Chicago.

BUDGET PASSES HOUSE OF LORDS

Peers Put Lloyd George's Bill Through Without a Division.

LANDSOWNE CONDEMNS

Unionist Leader Declares That Premier Asquith Capitulated to the Nationalists.

London, April 28.—In a single sitting, without opposition, the House of Lords tonight passed the budget bill, their first rejection of which led to the recent general election. The bill now only awaits the King's signature to become law. The royal approval will be given as a matter of course.

There was a large attendance in the House. The proceedings were uneventful, but some eloquent speeches were made. Lord Lansdowne, as leader of the Opposition, who was formally responsible for the rejection of the bill last year, recalled the fact that the Lords had referred the budget to the country, and added: "I have, as honorable men bound by pledges, no other course than to acquiesce in the passage of the bill on all its stages tonight."

Lord Lansdowne congratulated the Government upon the success of its diplomacy, which seemed, he declared, to be due to the sort of tactics adopted in Morocco and Somaliland, where allies of doubtful allegiance were brought into line by the offer of certain inducements. The Government had capitulated to a faction to whom it had intimated its readiness to overthrow the constitution by constitutional means, without having the smallest idea of what to put in its place. The Lord High Chancellor, Lord Loreburn, winding up, said: "We will not live as a Government in chains under the bondage of a Conservative majority in this House."

BRITAIN DOESN'T NEED ASSISTANCE

Kitchener Says She Can Take Care of Herself Without Children's Aid

London, April 29.—Lord Kitchener, interviewed with reference to the defence of Australia, said that for £1,700,000 a year, Australia will, in due course, have a complete system that will make her secure against attack. She will no longer need to look to the mother country for aid in the event of danger. The amount of money is but trivial to such a rich country.

Kitchener added that England is not decadent. Whatever anyone may say or think her sons are as good as ever, and as full-hearted. She is quite able, under God, to determine her own destinies. She needs help from none of her children or from strangers. She can quite take care of herself. "She has yet full youth of days, I assure you," said Lord Kitchener.

LOST PART OF HAND OPERATING BUZZ SAW

Accident to Mr. Ed. MacMurray, of Gladstone, Ont.

Mr. Ed. MacMurray, of Gladstone, suffered a very painful accident while at work on the farm of Mr. Luther Pinnegar, about a mile from Dorchester, yesterday afternoon, part of his right hand being amputated by a buzz saw which he was operating.

He was attended by Dr. Banghart, of Dorchester.

Mr. MacMurray's hand slipped against the machine, the blade entering the member diagonally through the fingers. He will be laid up for some time.

MAD DOG SCARE AT WOODSTOCK

Woodstock, April 29.—Drs. Purdee, of Toronto, and Tennant, of London, representing the provincial board of health, are in the city co-operating with the city council and board of health in an investigation of the mad-dog scare.

A dog, which has since been proven to have been affected with rabies, escaped from its owners a few days ago and bit several animals in the vicinity of Braemar. The provincial officials have issued orders for all of the bitten animals to be chained up and watched.

MONTREAL PLACES NEW CIVIC LOAN

Montreal, April 29.—The new civic loan of \$5,000,000 has been placed with the Bank of Montreal.

The loan is on the city certificates for £1,000,000, 40-year loan, at 4 per cent. The Bank of Montreal offered to take it at \$101.38, or a premium of 1 3/20 per cent, assuming all costs. The result is that the city will receive \$4,922,632 for its certificates with a face value of \$4,838,667, and avoid all costs of floating the loan.

NEW TRUSTEES FOR QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY

Kingston, April 28.—Revs. Dr. Campbell, Dr. Wardroppe, Dr. E. MacLaren, Messrs. A. T. Drummond, K. J. MacDonald, and George Gillies were re-elected Queen's trustees today. W. A. Logie, Hamilton, replaces Dr. MacLaren, and Hon. W. A. Charlton succeeds his brother, the late Hon. John Charlton.

PARKER FACES TRIAL FOR MURDER

Tuesday, April 29.—Robert Parker was yesterday committed for trial on a charge of having killed Wm. Masters, a farm laborer, who was found dead in the woods near here with gunshot wounds on his body.
