THE BODY OF LATE MONARCH NOW LIES IN THRONE ROOM

Remains Will Be Removed Tuesday, With Processional Pomp, to Westminster Hall—Royal Household at a Service Monday Night.

London, May 16.—Court, military and municipal officials, working at high pressure for the past few days, have completed the details of the arrangements for the King's funeral ceremonies this week. The preliminary obsequies began Saturday, when, it is reported, the King's body, after his brother, the Duke of Connaught, took his farewell look, was removed from the simple death-room to the splendid throne-room of the palace, which has been converted into a chapel ardente, where it will lie privately in state Sunday and Monday. On Tuesday it will be removed with processional pomp to Westminster Hall, where it will be publicly in state until Friday.

Upon the arrival of the body at Westminster Hall at noon tomorrow, there will be a brief religious service conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London. The service will be attended by the members of the House of Lords and the House of Commons. The hall will not be draped, and the ceremony will be of magnificent simplicity. The coffin will rest on a draped catafalque.

The only sign of decoration in the ancient hall will be a purple cloth covering the platform of the catafalque and the trappings of the bier. The King and Queen, the Queen Mother, and other royal mourners will be grouped about the catafalque during the brief service. Tonight the King, Queen, Queen Mother, other members of the royal family, officials and servants of the palace will attend a special devotional service before the body is removed to Westminster Hall tomorrow morning.

The participation of the public in the obsequies will begin tomorrow at noon, when the public lying-in-state begins. From then until the departure of the cortege from Paddington station for Windsor Castle Friday, the inhabitants and visitors will be spectators of a succession of solemn and impressive services.

The funeral of Queen Victoria touched London only in its passage from one railroad station to another. In King Edward's funeral the people will be able to witness the transit of the coffin from the palace to Westminster Hall, the two days' lying-in-state, and the final military pageant Friday, when the cortege will traverse three miles of the streets of London.

The city will be crowded tomorrow with an army of spectators, who are flocking to town from the provinces and the counties during four mournful days the people will pay a tribute to the royal dead that will probably be greater than any such tribute paid before.

PERLEY NEW WHIP FOR THE OPPOSITION

Will Have Permanent Offices and General Management of Party.

Ottawa, May 16.—George H. Perley, the member for Argenteuil, has been appointed chief outside whip of the Conservative party. This means that, following the British plan, there will be two chief whips, one for outside and one for inside work. Mr. Perley's duties will be mainly connected with organization and general party matters in the city, and through his hands will pass all correspondence and business associated with the Federal Conservative party generally.

Who the chief inside whip will be has not yet transpired. The names of several of the best men in the House have been mentioned, but it is probable that a western member will get the appointment.

The retirement of Mr. Geo. Taylor from the position of chief whip after long service of 26 years, is much regretted. He has been a faithful servant of the interests of the Conservative party since the days of Sir John A. Macdonald, by whom he was appointed chief whip.

Boston, May 16.—Representatives James H. Mellen, of Worcester, the dean of the Democratic legislators, is out with a boom for Congressman Eugene N. Foss, for the States senator to succeed Henry Cabot Lodge, whose term expires next spring.

"I am satisfied," said Mr. Mellen, "that Foss can be elected to the senate over Lodge. I believe Foss is the only Democrat who can beat Lodge. More than that, I believe Foss is the only Republican who can beat Lodge."

FAST MOTORING SAVED A LIFE

Son of Jim Hill Had an Exciting Race With Death.

Lakeview, Oregon, May 16.—Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, won an 80-mile race against death over the sands and rim rocks of the great Eastern Oregon desert yesterday when he drove his automobile, a woman who had been bitten by a rattlesnake.

The physicians reported the woman probably would recover. She is Mrs. George Gibbs, a farmer's wife. The woman encountered the snake in her door yard early yesterday morning. Soon after the accident, the Hill party of two automobiles, on the way from Lakeview to Burns, came on the scene, and being asked by the woman's husband to lend a helping hand, Mr. Hill readily consented to drive his fastest car with the woman as his only passenger.

A telephone call started a doctor to meet the party at Plush, on Warner Lake.

Louis W. Hill is a son of J. J. Hill, the world-famous railwayman, who is a former resident of Guelph, Ont., and whose brother still resides in that city.
