## FEAR GERMAN'S ARE BETTER MARKSMEN

English Naval Men Are Uneasy About Kaiser's Recent Practice.

London, April 4.—Grave uneasiness has been caused in naval circles by the reports which have reached England of the progress of the German fleet in gunnery. The particulars are of an indefinite character as the results of firing are jealously guarded, but it is believed that in this—the most important of all naval exercises—the German navy has greatly advanced in efficiency and that it is now superior to the British service.

The German emperor was so impressed by the late firings that he awarded prizes and other marks of distinction to four battleships and five cruisers—an unprecedented event, reflecting in the most marked manner his majesty's favor.

The feeling of anxiety has been increased by the recent figures of the results of the battle practice in the British fleet, which have just been issued. The contrast between the best and worst firing ships is, indeed, so marked as to occasion misgivings if absolutely nothing were known of the German progress. It looks as though the gunnery "boom" has exhausted itself. The vessels of the Dreadnought type have done particularly badly.

## NEW BASIS LIKELY FOR CHURCH UNION

Chancellor Burwash Believes Death Knell Sounded For Present Basis.

[Canadian Press.]

Toronto, April 4.—"The resolution of the Presbyterian committee yesterday appears to have sounded the death knell of church union," declared Chancellor Burwash, of the Victoria University this morning. "Of course it is not the final decision."

"That can only come from the General Assembly, which meets in June, but the decision of the committee may be taken as a fairly accurate forecast of the result. Still at this early stage it would not be wise for anyone who has been working for church union to say much in the matter."

"As will be seen by the reports of the meeting, the Presbyterians are divided among themselves. One party wants to drop the matter altogether, the other wishes union simply on educational and missionary lines."

"If this is secured the union will be a question of time, for the shoulder to shoulder working will draw the churches together and absolute union will come in the end."

"It is extremely unlikely that the Methodist and Congregational churches will essay a union if the Presbyterian Church declines to enter the coalition. Such a course would draw many ad-

Punta Arenas, Chile, April 4.—The British bark Indian Empire, which sailed from Cardiff, Wales, Dec. 7, for Mejollones has been wrecked off Cape Horn according to a report received here today. The Government has ordered a warship to go to her assistance. The Indian Empire is a steel ship of 1,620 tons.
