

GASOLINE PRICES BEING PROBED

Samples of Gasoline Taken and Replies To Questionnaire Filed.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—The committee under G. T. Clarkson inquiring into prices of gasoline in Ontario will soon commence holding public hearings. It is announced. Preliminary investigations by Mr. Clarkson have made it possible to hold public meetings in various United States points and many cities and towns of Ontario have been secured by the highways department and the commission has also tabulated replies received to a questionnaire forwarded to all Ontario dealers. This information will form the basis for further investigations.

Officials state they were given every facility by oil and gasoline distributing companies from which they sought information, and were given free access to the books of these companies.

MOSUL CLOUDS THICKEN AS TURKS WIELD SWORD;

Geneva Hears Fleeing Christians Disputed Region Are Put To Death.

DRAMATIC SESSION

League Members in Violent Demonstration Against Turkish Offensive.

Geneva, Sept. 24.—The British delegation to the League of Nations assembly today made public a telegram from the British high commissioner at Baghdad declaring that many Christians fleeing from the disputed Mosul region and attempting to reach Van, have been killed, as they were unable to keep up with their main column. The telegram says it is reported that 1,500 of this Christian party reached Van alive. Van is about 150 miles north of Mosul in Turkish Armenia.

SENDS COMMISSION.
Geneva, Sept. 24.—The Mosul muddle thickened tonight during a dramatic session of the council of the League of Nations, which M. Loucheur, as president, hastily adjourned after an outburst of disapproval of those present against the attitude of Rushdi Bey, head of the Turkish delegation, on the question of the deportation of Christians.

The committee of the council had introduced a resolution which substantially was approved, authorizing despatch of a special league commission to the Mosul area to examine the British charges that Christian Chaldeans were being ill-treated and expelled by the Turks. The Turkish countercharges, that British had occupied points held by the League of Nations, which M. Loucheur, as president, hastily adjourned after an outburst of disapproval of those present against the attitude of Rushdi Bey, head of the Turkish delegation, on the question of the deportation of Christians.

Col. Amery, British secretary for the dominions, insisted that the commissioner should not only have the right to pursue his investigation south of the Brussels line, which is occupied by the British, but also in the narrow Mosul strip north of that line occupied by the Turks.

Rushdi Bey evaded a clear answer; whereupon Col. Amery repeated his statement, saying: "I think Turkey should make perfectly clear its attitude on this important point."

Rushdi Bey replied that anything north of the Brussels line was Turkish, hence anything touching the treatment of the population there became a minority problem, which was not concerned with the main Mosul dispute.

Again Col. Amery put his question, demanding an unequivocal yes or no, but again the Turkish delegate refused to answer, saying he could only repeat his previous statements.

Murmurs of disapprobation arose from various parts of the hall, rapidly merging into a violent manifestation. M. Loucheur vigorously pounded the table and called for order. Immediately thereafter he announced that the debate was closed and the resolution adopted.

Session Adjourns.

caustically remarked, then quickly adjourned the session.

After once more denying the deportation of Christians, Rushdi Bey brought fresh charges against Great Britain. One was that an Irak band, after committing atrocities, had attacked a Turkish post north of the Brussels line. A second was that fifty persons of all ages and sexes, escaping from the oppressive rule of the British forced occupation, had taken refuge in the Turkish zone. A third charge was that a band of 500 including Assyrians, commanded by British officers, was preparing to attack the Turkish posts.

Col. Amery informed the council that about 8,000 Chaldean Christians had been deported by the Turks.

Rushdi Bey retorted that the Nestorians, who had abandoned Turkey, were working treacherously against Turkey on the British side. He demanded appointment of a special commission to make an investigation of the military situation and of all incidents which had occurred since the signing of the treaty of Lausanne in 1923. But the council declined to take action on his proposal.

Invasion of London Called Off
On Account of Mud In War Zone

London, Sept. 24.—The battle between the Blue and Red armies, with London as the objective, ended abruptly this evening, to the surprise of those who have been endeavoring to follow the manoeuvres and the delight of the bedraggled Tommies.

Latest reports say the attack of General Chetwode's Blue forces, who were defending London, did not develop decisively, and that "cease fire" sounded with General Godley's invading Red troops holding a strong line.

The operations began at dawn Tuesday, and instead of waiting for the invasion, the defenders made a surprise attack, advancing into Red territory. From that on, owing to the flooded condition of the entire area of 2,000 square miles in the zone of the operations, few details are known of the movements of the respective armies, and it is presumed that the manoeuvres were brought to a close a day ahead of time because of the physical difficulties encountered by the troops, many of whom were green men.

PROVINCE TO AID APPLE MARKETING

Government Will Purchase 25,000 Barrels To Be Shipped Overseas.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—Hon. John S. Martin, minister of agriculture for Ontario, today announced government assistance in the marketing of the apple crop of the province. The government will carry out an extensive publicity campaign urging the citizens to use home-grown fruit, and will aid in securing export markets by purchasing 25,000 barrels of representative apples to be shipped overseas with a view to favorably impressing the buyers there with the quality of the Ontario fruit. This latter action by the government

will constitute the first time in which the provincial government has been in the marketing of a fruit crop, going to the extent of assisting to finance it. The fruit purchased by the government will be subject to government inspection and will be branded with the stamp of government approval. The grower will be paid the market price, so that he can make a profit on its handling of the fruit, the surplus will also be paid to the grower after deducting transportation and selling costs.

HYLAN STILL SOUGHT
AS CANDIDATE IN N. Y.

New York, Sept. 24.—A series of conferences will be held between Mayor John F. Hylan and several of his supporters today to determine whether he will enter New York's mayoralty race at the head of a third ticket. Representatives of the Five-Cent Fare club and the Honest Government league were to call upon the mayor in an effort to induce him to run independently.

Cabinet Meeting Held At Ottawa

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—A brief meeting of the cabinet was held here today, following the return of Premier Mackenzie King from his Maritime campaign tour. No announcement was made after the council and it is understood that only routine matters were discussed. Another council meeting may be held before the premier leaves tomorrow night for Western Canada. The only ministers attending today's council were the premier, Hon. T. A. Low, minister of trade and commerce; Hon. A. B. Copp, secretary of state; Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, and Hon. George Boivin, minister of customs.

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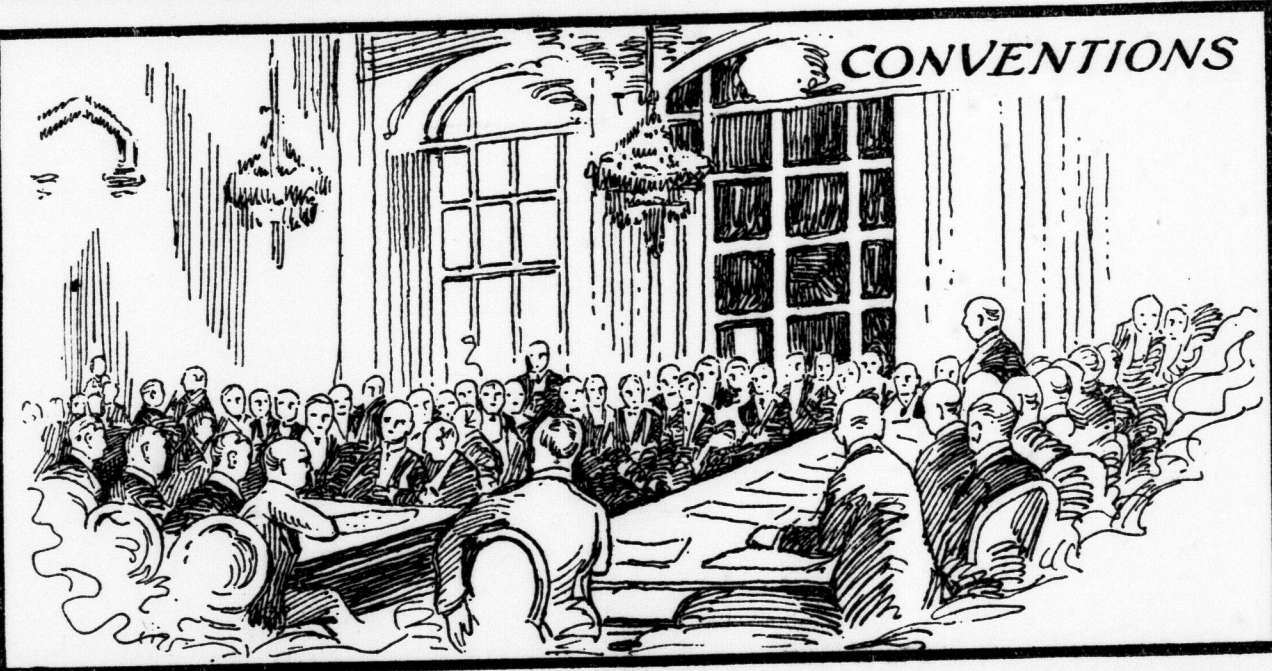
